CRUK told us that a single bag on average raises funds for them of between £25-£30 and even more with a completed gift aid tag which we all encourage members to fill in. So, working on the lowest £25 estimate that would mean an amazing £16,225.00.!!!!! We're so glad to have been a small part of this event knowing that Since 2013, when the Clothes Throw event first started Slimming World members have donated over £18 million worth of pre-loved items to Cancer Research UK thanks to this activity. We cannot wait to hear the final 'tally' for the company this year and I'll let you know when we have it.

We feel honoured to partner with CRUK for this event as facts show that being overweight has been shown to increase the risk of developing some types of cancer and although being overweight doesn't mean that someone will develop cancer. Although a person's exact risk will depend on lots of factors, including things they can't change such as age and genetics.

Losing weight and maintaining a healthy weight will help our members lead a healthier life and could prevent around 22,800 cases of cancer every year in the UK.

# Tuna Pasta Salad

Tasty tuna, crunchy carrot and sweetcorn seasoned with herbs and black pepper. Ready in 30 mins Serves 4 | Syn free

#### **Ingredients**:

- 200g can sweetcorn, drained
- 200g can tuna in brine, drained
- 1 medium carrot, peeled and coarsely grated
- 1 small red onion, finely chopped
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper For the Dressing:
- 1 tsp mustard powder
- 300g fat free natural yogurt
- Juice of 1 lemon
- ¼ tsp turmeric
- 2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley
- 1 heaped tbsp chopped fresh chives

#### Method

- 1. Cook the pasta according to the pack instructions and drain. Cool under cold running water, drain again and tip the pasta into a large bowl.
- 2. Meanwhile, mix all the dressing ingredients in a bowl.
- 3. Add the sweetcorn, tuna, carrot and red onion to the pasta. Pour over the dressing, season to taste and mix well.







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

# Nail Reconstruction

➢ Toenails can easily become damaged by trauma, sports, footwear, lifestyle, fungal infections, and sometimes bad nail care. When they become damaged, they can become discoloured and may grow back thicker and/ or uneven. Usually, they are not uncomfortable but instead may look unsightly and becoming self-conscious about this issue is a common reaction. As the warmer months approach many people avoid wearing sandals that show their feet for this reason.

This is where we come in! Nail reconstruction is a way of rebuilding a nail so that it looks and feels like a normal nail. We use a product called Pedisafe<sup>®</sup> which is a flexible gel that is antifungal, and antimicrobial so helps to protect the nail as well as improve the appearance. It also provides a protective later making it less damaging to the nails than salon gel polish.

for anyone with the following: damaged, thickened, uneven nails, discolouration, cracked or lifted nails, fungal and psoriatic nails. Unfortunately, it is not suitable if you are pregnant, have active skin cancers, have neuropathy or poor wound healing, are under 6 or are going into hospital. It is also important to note that we need approximately 10% of your existing nail so that the new nail has something to adhere to.



In your appointment, we use an electric file to thin down your nail as much as possible. This is not painful and may make your nail look more uneven but do not worry, as this is and important step to create a thin foundation to build your new nail. We then apply many layers of gel and use a low-level UV light to cure each layer. The amount of layers needed depends on the extent of the damage to the existing nail.

Nail reconstruction can last anywhere from 4-6 weeks, however if the area gets repeatedly wet or hit, it may not last as long. If you are going abroad, we recommend 20 mins in a pool x2 a day at the most as long as the nail is dried thoroughly. We also ask that you do not have a bath/shower the day of your appointment and do not get the area wet after 10pm the evening before. It is a very safe treatment and is suitable As we use a low-level UV light, you will also need to apply a factor 50 sun lotion to your feet 30 minutes before your appointment to protect your skin.

# A short tale of long tailed tits

Coleshill Town Council allotment holders are used to growing brassica oleracea, solanum tuberosum and lycopersicum, and phaseolus coccineus alongside other fruit and veg.

Now they can add aegithalos caudatus to the list: otherwise known as the long tailed tit. For at one of the allotments, a pair have nested in the metal gate post at the entrance.


Usually they build their nest in a bush or in the fork of a tree, from moss, camouflaged with lichen with interwoven cobwebs and sometimes bits of paper stuck on the outside.

Things are about to get busy down by the gate post. The female incubates a clutch of between 8-12 eggs (though sometimes as many as 15).

After 14-18 days in the nest, the young are ready to make their first flights.



#### **NEWS FROM THE ALLOTMENT By Jenny Watts**

It has been a wet and cold start to the spring so far and as such our growing season has started a little later than usual. We have sown lots of seeds including tomatoes, sweetcorn, courgettes and beans. Some are growing quickly and we have potted them on but others are only just beginning to come through so we are hoping that warmer weather will be here to stay soon to bring them on. We need to wait until all risk of frost has passed to plant out the more tender plants such as tomatoes, beans and sweetcorn.

Our onions are growing strongly and will be ready for harvesting in late June along with the garlic. The potatoes are also growing well and we will continue to "earth them up" which entails using a hoe to pile soil on top of the leaves so that the potatoes that form aren't exposed to light as this can turn them green and inedible.

We finally have some pretty blossoms on the fruit trees so we are hoping for some bumper fruit harvests later in the year. The raspberries, currants and tayberry plants are also bursting into life again after the winter rest. They have plenty of buds on them and we are looking forward to some tasty harvests in a few months, although we are always happy to leave a few on the bush to share with the birds.

Our allotment pond is a hive of activity with tadpoles so we are hoping some will survive to become frogs. The bees are buzzing around the flowers so hopefully everything will be well pollinated. They are such an important insect and do an amazing job for gardeners!

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## **Cllr Martin McCarthy, Castle Bromwich Ward (Solihull MBC)** June Update

Following the local elections in May Leslie Kaye has been elected as the new councillor for Castle Bromwich. He would like to thank you all for your support in achieving this, we all look forward to working with you to address all those issues involved in making Castle Bromwich a great place to live, study and work.

We have been in touch with Council officers about the poor finish that the Grass cutting contractors have left in several places around the area, this has been reviewed with the contractors, we now expect to see some improvement, please let us know if there are any further issues.

The road works trenching on Water Orton Road and Green lane will be finished with an interim surface to allow for any settlement, this will be replaced with a new surface across the roadway when this has had time to occur.

As the planned traffic management works on Water Orton Road progress we would like to avoid the dangerous rat running to avoid the temporary traffic lights that residents have seen on the service roads. How do Water Orton Road residents feel about temporarily blocking these for the duration of the works to stop this awful practice ?

Many residents are concerned about unsightly building work taking place at the front of a property in the upper part of Chester Road, A Planning application has been made and has been rejected for this, an SMBC enforcement notice has been served requiring removal of the unapproved structure.

We continue to pursue work to renovate the section of the Green Man Way footpath which runs between Park Hall Academy and Lanchester park, some initial work should be undertaken by SMBC soon with funding being sought for an all-weather surface in the future. I have reviewed Parish Council plans for

a new play area in Arden Park, I hope that you will agree that these will deliver an excellent play facility for our local children.

• "On the fairest time of June, You may go, with sun or moon" so said the poet John Keats over two hundred years ago. Did he have a secret view on the future we wonder as yes, in June this year, there are opportunities to go to the Gardens with the sun and the moon.

We're very conscious of the changing seasons here up on the hill in Castle Bromwich. Through the trees and under the big skies, we have a great view down across the Parkland all the way into the centre of Birmingham city itself.

#### **Evenings in June**

Early mornings and sunset evenings can be really beautiful from our vantage point As always we like to share these pleasures with our friends and well-wishers.



Early evening music treats start with our regular fortnightly Melon Ground Sessions. Pop along for our eclectic mix of acoustic music on Thursday evenings. Wander the Gardens as the sun sets and let the sounds of the bees and rustling leaves mix with the music in the Melon Ground. The evenings are led by veteran and versatile guitarist Vo fletcher who is joined each time by a different musical wizard to create unique sounds ranging across folk, jazz, world and blues music. The bar is open, the seats are comfy, the atmosphere relaxed. Tickets (£12) on the door.



For a bigger musical experience join us on Saturday 1st July for one of our monthly Saturday Sounds in the ClaireVoie. The ever active 'Soul Sessions Brum' are guest curators offering a fine evening of soulful music and chilled atmosphere in a beautiful outdoors space, good vibes are guaranteed for all. The natural amphitheatre of the ClaireVoie space in the Gardens is the intimate space for the stage for this Saturday's outing. 

#### Will does it again

## Gardener's Tips for June 2023

S Tender veg and annual plants you may have been growing indoors can finally go outside, but remember those plants have been living a pampered life indoors - before planting out harden them off first by taking them outside in a sheltered position or bring them in at night. If you have citrus plants the risk of frost should have passed and they will benefit from being outside.

Remember the sun in June can heat up a greenhouse very quickly - it may have already done this in May -so ensure you have adequate ventilation and shading in place to stop any plants from frying.

Last year's dry weather may have managed to finally kill off quite a proportion of your older and established plants, so hopefully you have been able to nurture some replacements this year. Make sure your watering regime - inside any greenhouses as well as outside remains regular and moderate, we saw what damage alternate drought and downpour can do last year.

Prune any Spring flowering shrubs to keep them compact, plants such as mock orange and forsythia benefit from having older stems removed. The flowers are formed on older wood, so by removing just the oldest of the woody stems the plant can remain a manageable size but still be able to flower next year.

In the veg garden plant out any tender veg raised indoors, sweetcorn when planted should be done in blocks and not lines as this aids pollination and increases the crop produced and any early salad crops such as lettuce and radish should now be ready to harvest and eat. Don't forget to water in dry weather especially when plants are forming their fruits and feed any beans, tomatoes and courgettes with tomato feed as they take a lot of goodness out of the ground to produce their high yielding crop.

#### **#NoMowMay**

Well done if you followed Plantlife's annual campaign advice to leave your lawns and open spaces uncut for May. don't forget to go slowly with the mower with your first June cuts: that grass and those wildflower seed heads can be tough on your machine blades.

Why NoMow May? We've lost nearly 97% of flower rich meadows since the 1970's and with them gone are vital food needed by pollinators, like bees and butterflies.

A healthy lawn with some long grass and wildflowers benefits wildlife, tackles pollution and can even lock away carbon below ground – and best of all, to reap these benefits all you have to do is not mow your lawn in May!

There are over 20 million gardens in the UK so even the smallest grassy patch adds up to a significant proportion of land which, if managed properly, can deliver enormous gains for nature, communities and the climate.

The Gardens are obliged to maintain the manner and style of the Gardens from over 350 years ago - which was certainly less concerned with conserving the 'natural and the wild than we are.

But we nevertheless embrace #NoMowMay in our wilder areas, but have to cut the main lawn to keep the grass healthy and accessible for you visitors. Even so continue to do as much as we can to naturally attract bees and insects to the Gardens... for the benefit of us all on this planet.

## Free Franks, The 2nd Earl of Bradford and Mrs Eliza Case

Before the introduction of the postage stamp in 1840, there existed a method of postage known as a 'free frank'. A free frank was essentially a hand stamped mark made on mail to indicate that the item did not require any sort of paid postage. Free Franking wasn't available to just anybody though. The privilege of free franking was only afforded to four different classes. Those classes were, members of parliament, peers sitting in the House of Lords, office holders who qualified via certain acts of parliament and to archbishops and bishops sitting in the House of Lords. As well as the hand stamped frank, free franks also required the sender to hand sign the cover of whatever was being sent, be that a letter or a parcel. During the first three or four decades of the 1800's, free franks were eagerly sought after by autograph hunters. This was most commonly achieved by the cutting out of the front panel on the envelope which carried the stamp and signature of the sender, which of course were required under the use of the free frank privilege. Contrary to its name however, this service wasn't entirely free. The bill for all of this parliamentary post had to be picked up by the taxpayer, and as such, the service was open to abuse by those who qualified for the free franking service. MP's were known to have sold their frank to businesses and regularly franked letters for friends and relatives. I guess some things never change.



Which brings me to the reason behind todays article. I'm not a collector of free fronts (the name often used to describe the cut out section of the free frank letter), but I do keep an eager eye out for items pertaining to the history of Castle Bromwich. Recently I came across this item. It's a free front that was sent from Castle Bromwich by George Bridgeman, the 2nd Earl of Bradford, in the year 1834, to a Mrs Case of Shenstone near Lichfield.

First a little about George Bridgeman...



George Bridgeman was born on the 23rd of October 1789 and was the eldest son of Orlando Bridgeman, the 1st Earl of Bradford and Lucy Elizabeth Byng. He was educated at Harrow School, London, and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he graduated with a Master of Arts in 1810. When his father died in 1825, George succeeded his fathers titles and family seats, which included both Weston Park in Staffordshire and Castle Bromwich Hall and gardens. George married twice during his lifetime. His first marriage was to a lady called Georgina Moncreiffe on the 5th of March 1818 and together they had six children. Two of whom were sisters named Lady Lucy Caroline Bridgeman, born in 1826, and Lady Charlotte Anne Bridgeman, born in 1827. I mention these two ladies specifically, because in the year 1858, when both ladies were in their early 30's, they tragically died after their crinoline dresses were set alight by sparks from the fireplace in the library of the family home at Weston Park. The sisters suffered horrific burns and passed away within a week of one another. George Bridgeman, the 2nd Earl of Bradford, passed away at Weston Park in 1865 aged 75 years. He was succeeded by his eldest son and heir Orlando Bridgeman, the 3rd Earl of Bradford

The recipient of the letter was a lady named Eliza Case. The Case family lived in Shenstone, Staffordshire in a property once known as 'The Moss'. Eliza's husband, a gentleman named Henry Case, purchased The Moss in the year 1808 and the family were living there by 1809. Henry was born in or around the year 1774 in Huvton, Lancashire and married Eliza Case (nee Ford) on the 27th of September 1808. Right around the time that the family purchased The Moss. Together the couple had eight children. Unfortunately, on the 10th of October 1824 aged 50 years old, Henry passed away. Eliza Case was just 42 years old when she was widowed. However, it seems that she wasn't short of company as it's said that Eliza and her children were often very sought after as dinner party guests and that she frequently entertained people at The Moss. Said to have been a very attractive lady, she probably had a great deal of willing suitors. Eliza and her children continued to live at The Moss until the year 1847 when it appears that it was sold to a gentleman by the name of Thomas Bagnall. Eliza Case passed away in Leamington in the year 1866 aged 78 and her body was returned to Shenstone where she was laid to rect

I guess we'll never know what was contained within the correspondence sent by George Bridgeman to Eliza Case in 1834. The writing on the reverse of the free front is extremely difficult to decipher and even if I were able to understand it, I'm certain that it would only give us a relatively small peak into what it's content would once have been. But both George and Eliza were of a similar age and part of what I can only describe as being the upper echelons of British society. I'm almost certain that they'd have had shared interests and were maybe even close friends during their lifetimes. It's strange to think that this small slip of paper began its journey in Castle Bromwich almost 2 centuries ago, destined for a village in Staffordshire. Most probably sought after by collectors of items like these for the last 188 years, it could actually have travelled the length and breadth of the country. Until now that is. Now it's back where it began all those very many years ago, in Castle Bromwich.





Retrieved by local divers from a sunken shipwreck, the dress offers tantalising clues about the way people lived and died during Holland's famous Golden Age. Jo's research leads her to Anna Tesseltje, a poor Amsterdam laundress who served Catharina van Shurman, portrait painter to the Dutch court. The two women were said to be close, so why did Anna abandon Catharina at the height of her misfortune? And how did Anna come to possess such a precious dress? Jo is determined to find out, while battling academic politics and personal demons.

An engrossing, fascinating story with dual timelines, history and interesting characters. Compelling and beautifully written. This is well worth a read. Review by Castle Bromwich Library member

# **Shustoke Volunteering Event 8th May**







♦ As part of the celebrations for the coronation of King Charles Shustoke took part in The Big Help Out which was a day of volunteering on Bank Holiday Monday 8th May. Shustoke is lucky in having a Field in Trust for the benefit of local residents. Over the last 18 months a group known as the Working Group for the Recreation Ground, set up by Shustoke Parish Council, has been working to develop the field both for recreation, biodiversity and as a place where all ages can meet, socialise and have fun!

Following a survey of the residents a long-term plan for development was drawn up and agreed by the Parish Council. So far we have developed a path around part of the field and an Adult trim Trail funded by a National Lottery Awards for All grant and Councillor funding provided by Councillor David Wright. As part of a Partnership with Warwickshire Wildlife Trust, Picadilly Recreation Ground and Ansley Common Allotments we have planted trees and started a small orchard. As part of that project we sowed two large areas of wildflower meadow and made wildflower seed bombs to take away as part of the activities for the Volunteer Day.

The main aim of the day was to develop a Sensory Garden in a neglected area of the field. In the build up to the day donations of pallets, tyres, roof tiles, wood, sticks/fir cones/bug hotel materials and soil for the tyre planters. Local residents were generous in their donations a growing pile of materials developed over 3 weeks. The organisers, Lisa Dupree and her Mum Elaine and Dad Graham then prepared the activities which included: tyre planters, 3 bug hotels, den building, barefoot path,





recycled art crown made of pained stones and a bottle top flag. A small grant from Warwickshire Borough Council meant that the volunteers on the day could enjoy a much needed BBQ lunch!

The event started at 11am with a small group of people but then as the rain cleared lots more families turned up! In total we had about 50 people. Everyone chose what they wanted to do and many bought their own tools to work with. Everyone worked really hard but had great fun too! There was lots of fun chatting with friends and meeting new ones!

The BBQ was much appreciated and the area looked entirely different by the end of the day! Three bug hotels are now awaiting lots of creepy crawlies. A brilliant den, with a barefoot walk leading up to it will provide local children with lots of fun times. The painted stones were carefully laid to make a spectacular crown. The tyres were positioned to create a barrier between the area and the access road and filled with grass and then a top layer of tyres were filled with soil and a range of red, white and blue plants and some herbs. The area has gone from a neglected and overgrown corner to a place that children and adults can really enjoy! Everyone taking part had a great day and went home tired but very satisfied with what had been achieved in just a few hours. We will be planning more volunteering activities in the future.

A new group called The Friends of Shustoke Queen Elizabeth II Field is now being established which will be specifically aimed at fund raising and sourcing grant funding to enable our plans for the Children's Play area and other amenities to move forward. The main outcome of the survey was to have some children's play area so that will now become a priority for the new group.







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

# Interiors (6) Decorating



# **Decorating tips**

As professional decorators we often find ourselves being called upon by our customers for advice on colours and over the years we have spent a lot of time researching and learning about the different ways that colour can influence the mood or feeling in a room.

It's important to consider the impact that colour will have on a space when considering what you're trying to achieve and how the room will be used. The effect of different colours can range from subtle to dramatic. This in turn will influence your emotions in that room creating everything from feeling motivated and upbeat to more relaxed and restful.

As a starting point there are a few basic principles that tend to remain constant. There can be exceptions but these general rules should make a good starting point when considering colours for your project.

- Pale colours often add an uplifting feeling to a room
- Neutrals feel natural and often make you feel grounded
- Whites are very clean and crisp feeling and provide an excellent blank canvas to express
- yourself with accessories such as ornaments and artwork
- Deeps give a room a very dramatic feeling and a sense of opulence

If we take these rules and start looking at specific colours we can start to consider how these can be applied in our homes. Pale colours like light pinks and blues and pastel shades are very easy to live with. They tend to encourage a positive mental attitude. They are also similar to whites in that rather than dominate a room they can provide a good backdrop for you to express your creative approach to interior design with things such as soft furnishings and artwork

Neutrals have always been a popular choice, no more so than the last 6 years or so with the dominance of greys as a colour choice within the home. Looking beyond grey though we can start to consider earthy tones such as ochre and slate. These provide interest and provide a sense of warmth or coolness while continuing to provide the feeling of calmness associated with neutrals. With neutrals- particularly greys- you get the advantage of them appearing different depending on how then light shifts. This provides further interest and can be particularly effective in rooms that are used throughout the day.

Whites are among the most versatile of colours when it comes to providing a backdrop to the rest of the design features within a room. They allow you complete freedom with interior design touches such as cushions and lampshades without ever making you feel restricted or limited to certain colour schemes. I you are using white it's worth considering off-whites such as Farrow and Ball's Wevet as these will make the overall effect feel softer than standard or pure brilliant white. A handy tip when looking at off whites is to make note of where they are placed in the colour chart. They often feature alongside or underneath specific colour groups. This is an indication of what kind of off-white it is So if it's with the group of pink through to red shades then it will have a touch of that in it. This takes the uncertainty out of choosing an alternative colour for things like feature walls. If you pick one from the same group then it should compliment the off-white. At the same time the hint of colour in the off-white is subtle enough for it not to interfere or clash if you want to use a totally different colour group for other design features in the room.

Finally onto the dramatic deep colours. These are often the most difficult choice as if you pick the wrong one they can be very difficult to live with as they tend to dominate a space. Whereas neutral and light colours are usually easier to adjust to even if you're not sure you've made the right choice. At the moment deep blues are very popular but deep and impactful shades of green and teal are also featuring in a lot of projects. The more tentative approach is to just use them as feature colours on 1 or 2 walls or am chimney breast. This can be very effective at bringing interest to a room but the more bold approach is to flood the room with them creating a sense of creativity and confidence within a space. The common consensus is that darker colours can make rooms feel smaller and while this is sometimes true they can have the opposite effect. Deep colours can dissolve boundaries which creates depth in a room. Another way to use deeper colours is to us a lighter colour on walls then the deep colour on woodwork such as skirting, door frames and doors and picture rails. This is great way of introducing drama and interest to a room without being overpowering.

## Former Paratrooper & RAF Reservist Pushed Hard to Gain 715th and 716th Sporting Feat

♦ North Warwickshire World Champion Paddy Doyle proved to his arch rivals that he is capable of raising his game by setting a cross country duathlon speed march 5 km cross country run / walk carrying 20lb back pack, and 10km mountain bike challenge over a non - technical course in a combined time of 1hr. 12 min. 30 sec, bringing his documented career fitness endurance feats and World Records to 715.

Rowington Village footpaths, Heart of England Way footpath and Grand Union Canal tow path Warwickshire was the venue for the latest challenge, the course is ideal due to various hilly inclines and open cross country footpaths.

"I will be attempting many more outdoor duathlons and triathlons in the future involving kayaking, mountain biking and cross country weighted back pack speed marches it will be tough but I know I can put in the time to improve my mountain bike and kayak techniques which help me to push myself further ."

Doyle's latest duathlon was setting another new course record time kayaking 8 km on the River Leam and 5 km cross country speed march carrying 20lb back pack over the Millennium Way footpath Leamington Spa in a combined time of 1 hr. 36 min. 05 sec. The first 4 km's was paddling up river but Doyle's upper body strength paid off keeping him on target from the start line.

"Training for the river kayaking discipline has been hard, I have been doing British Canoe Union kayak skills courses for the last nine months, a big thank you to the Leam BCU coaches who put me through my paces which will also help me in the future to attempt more Kayak combined attempts."

Completing the two latest duathlons now brings the total to 716 physical fitness challenges and World Records covering 8 different sporting categories.


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
