

On Friday 3rd March 2023, my lovely mother was diagnosed with breast cancer - grade 3. This meant it was fast spreading, she underwent her first operation on Wednesday 8th March 2023, just a few days after the diagnosis. The operation went well, however, it was discovered the cancer had spread to her lymph nodes. Therefore, she underwent her second operation on 29th March 2023. The sample was then sent to the USA, for a recently funded test where it determines if chemotherapy is required. Unfortunately, it came back that my mom does require chemo and then radio. However, this test is one of the examples of what Cancer Research funds from the money raised.

On Wednesday 12th July 2023, I am getting most of my hair cut off (bob length,

not a fully shaven head!) which will be sent to the Little Princess Trust charity. The type of chemo my mom is having will result in hair loss so she will know exactly what these young people will be going through. Open Spaces Society chairman slates government for lack of action on public access

'The Open Spaces Society is often critical of the government's approach to open access opportunities.' So said the society's chairman, Phil Wadey, in his keynote speech at the society's AGM on 6 July.

He continued: 'Back in January, the government announced an environmental improvement plan for England which aspired to having every household no more than "a 15-minutes' walk of a green or blue space". We called for such green space to be permanent in nature, such as by registration as a town or village green, or by dedication of public rights of way, but there remains no detail on how the plan will be made effective.

'Nearly 17 years ago, the Commons Act 2006 allowed the reopening of commonland registration in certain circumstances in designated local authority areas [pioneer areas]. The window for making applications was short: only 13 years was allowed in each of the pioneer areas in England. This led to the society appointing staff and consultants to beat the deadline, and we have applied for 86 pieces of land to be registered as common so far.

'While deadlines with clear effect can be useful to stimulate public response, other deadlines can be far more sinister,' said Phil.

'We were dismayed when the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, Dr

Coffey, announced plans to reintroduce the cut-off date, more accurately known as Path Extinguishment Day, that her department had decided to repeal last year, without ever knowing exactly what they are extinguishing. We continue to lobby for the exemptions to be brought in at the same time as the cut-off date provisions are commenced, as we fear that government will otherwise not get around to the exemptions that will save some of our rights of way.

'I therefore call on all who can to go out and apply to record the rights of way they use that are not yet on the definitive map: let's see if the various user groups and volunteers can do as well with rights of way recording (in percentage terms) as we have with commons recording, and let's see if recording our paths means that more households will be close to guaranteed green spaces,' Phil concluded.

The Property market.....what now?

▶ It will be no surprise if I tell you that the property market has changed over the last six months and it would seem the good times are behind us.....for a while!

We are long overdue a downfall in the market, and although predictions range from a drop in price of between 5% and 35%, I think it is more likely that we will have a soft landing and prices, although will fall, will not be as dramatic as the press makes out.

Bricks and mortar as always been a solid investment. We are now seeing Landlords, who bought investment properties in the 1990's, selling as they get older. Its hard work being a Landlord with all the new legislation they have to adhere too. There are two sides to this scenario, firstly it will release first time buyer properties onto the market, secondly it will reduce the housing stock for renters. Only time will tell how this will all work out, but as mortgages become more expensive as will the monthly rental amounts. Property prices are out of control and we need this adjustment to bring back some sanity. It's time to calm things down, take a deep breath and look around us, it couldn't go on forever......







Summer satay bowl

The scrummy sauce adds a nutty sweetness to this crunchy vegan salad Ready in 30 mins Serves $4 \mid 3$ Syns per serving



Ingredients:

- 2 level tsp sesame seeds
- 250g dried rice vermicelli noodles
- Low-calorie cooking spray
- 300g plain firm tofu, drained and cut into bite-size cubes
- 2 carrots, sliced into batons
- 2 red peppers, deseeded and finely sliced
- 100g runner beans, strings removed and finely sliced
- ¼ large cucumber, sliced into batons

- ¼ red cabbage, finely shredded
- Sprigs of fresh coriander and mint, to serve
- Pinch of dried chilli flakes (optional), to serve

For the satay sauce:

- 2 level tbsp smooth peanut butter
- 2 tbsp soy sauce or tamari
- \bullet Juice of 1 unwaxed lime
- 1 level tsp maple syrup
- 1 small garlic clove, crushed

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas 4.
- 2. Spread the sesame seeds out on a non-stick baking tray and bake for 4-5 minutes, until golden, then set aside. At the same time, soak the noodles in just-boiled water for 10 minutes, then drain and cool under cold running water. Divide between 4 bowls. Mix together the satay sauce ingredients with a splash of water and set aside.
- 3. Spray a large non-stick frying pan with low-calorie cooking spray and put it over a medium-high heat. Cook the tofu for 3-4 minutes, until crisp and golden, turning occasionally.
- 4. Arrange the tofu and vegetables on top of the noodles.

 Sprinkle a quarter of the sesame seeds and sauce over each bowl, then scatter over the herbs and chilli flakes (if using) to serve.



News from St Clement of Alexandria Green Lane, Castle Bromwich (known locally as St Clements Church)

St Clements decided that it was important to recognise Father's Day on the 18th June, so after the service, milky ways and twix were given out to members of the congregation, reminding us of the importance of fathers and those that take on this responsibility make to all of our lives.

On Sunday 2nd July we were very pleased to be able to give the following announcement to the Congregation of St Clements and look forward to working together with St Mary and St Margaret Church, with Revd Fiona Harrison-Smith at the helm.

St Mary & St Margaret Castle Bromwich and St Clement of Alexandria Castle Bromwich "Bishop Anne, the Acting Bishop of Birmingham, with Lord Bradford as Patron of St Mary & St Margaret, is delighted to announce the appointment of the Revd Fiona Harrison-Smith as the next incumbent of the parishes of St Mary & St Margaret Castle Bromwich and St Clement of Alexandria Castle Bromwich.

Fiona is currently the vicar of St Gabriel's Weoley Castle in Church of England Birmingham. Arrangements for Fiona's institution and collation will be announced as soon as possible. In the meantime, please keep Fiona, her family, and her present and future parishes, in your prayers".

Change of Name - As you know the pandemic scuppered the Oasis Community Café so much so, that in March 2020 we had to shut down what had been a very successful 8 years and which suddenly came to an abrupt end. Not defeated, a small committee was formed with the backing of the PCC and after much thought, work and decisions that proved not easy to make, work started on the 5th December 2022 to transform the then Bridgeman Room and what was called the warden's office (storeroom) into a new kitchen with a small seated area. This area is now complete and will take the Church back to its original vision which we had in 2012 when the first meeting took place. This is a much smaller space with access through the main Church (which is now left set-up as a Church) or the rear entrance.

After much thought and consideration the new name will be MARY BRIDGEMAN TEA AND COFFEE LOUNGE and will accommodate about 24 people at any one time with a new much reduced menu on offer. There is still much to be done, learning how to use all the new equipment for a start, from the dishwasher to the coffee machine. The Forget Me Not Memory Café which is run by volunteers from the Church on the last Thursday of each month, will move into this space giving a much quieter area for those that come with their carers. The Chapel will be open for those that wish to have a quiet space to sit, reflect or remember loved ones.

What day(s) we will open to the public and how often has yet to be decided, especially as we need to rely on our wonderful volunteers, but at the present time the Committee is looking towards the end of September. We will keep you posted.

On Monday 26th June and Monday 3rd July, St Clements were pleased to be able to welcome Smith's Wood Primary Academy Year 2 children. The Rev. Gloria Smith and our Lay Reader Anne Daniels were on hand to explain about the Church and were supported by Ann Kew, our Sacristan.

We are also very grateful to Jenny Watts who keeps us updated on what having an allotment means, with all the challenges and the lows and highs of gardening, the hard work and the rewards gained. Read on....

The allotment is in full swing now and every time we visit, new growth can be seen. This also however, includes the weeds which have also enjoyed the combination of rain and sunshine. We leave some weeds to flower for the bees and also use nettle leaves to make food for the plants. This is done by soaking the leaves in a bucket of water for a month, hen watering down the resulting liquid by 1 part nettle liquid to 9 parts water. This makes a nitrogen rich food for leafy vegetables such as cabbages and kale.

The tomatoes and courgettes are growing well and we have picked our first courgette which was very tasty. Our beetroot and turnips are almost ready, we are just waiting for them to grow a bit bigger. The beans are climbing their way up the poles and are just beginning to flower.

Unfortunately, due to the cold and wet spring, the fruit harvest this year so far has been much smaller than previous years as the blossom we had earlier in the year didn't develop into much fruit. The grapevine however is bucking this trend and has lots of trusses of green grapes so we are looking forward to these being ready in a couple of months after they have had a chance to mature.



Our pond is teeming with life and we have had lots of tiny froglets hopping around the plot. They spend most of their time on land although they go back to the pond on hot days. In a few years, hopefully they will lay their own frogspawn.

Month in August - Change of date - Forget Me Not Memory Café will be on Thursday 17th August (3rd Thursday of the month) from $1-2.30~\mathrm{pm}$ for those with memory loss and their carers.

21 million scam emails reported

▶ Almost 21 million reports have been made to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS), resulting in the removal of over 235,000 malicious websites.

SERS was launched by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) and the City of London Police in April 2020 to enable the public to forward suspicious emails to an automated system that scans them for malicious links. Since its launch, almost 21 million reports have been made to the service

Mobile phone providers also offer a service that allows customers to report suspicious text messages, by forwarding them to the number 7726. The service is free of charge and enables providers to takedown malicious websites and block malicious texts from being sent across their network.

As of 31 May 2023, 54,000 text message scams have been removed as a result of suspicious texts forwarded to the 7726 service.

Commander Nik Adams, from City of London Police, said:

"Every year, thousands of people in the UK are scammed by a fraudulent email or text message. Phishing scams, whether it's a text message claiming you have missed a delivery and are required to pay a redelivery fee, or an email claiming to be from your bank are a common security challenges that both individuals and businesses across the UK face on a daily basis.

"If you receive an email or text message that you think might be a scam, don't respond to it or click any links in the message or email. Instead, contact the organisation directly using contact information from the company's official website, and not the links or numbers provided in the message itself.

"If you think you have been a victim of fraud, report it to Action Fraud at www. actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. By reporting phishing scams or suspected fraud, you are directly helping us in our work to identify and stop these criminals and helping us protect others from these scams. If you are in Scotland, I ask that you report the fraud directly to Police Scotland by calling 101."

How to protect yourself from scam emails and texts

Received an email or text that seems suspicious? Report it. Your reports enable us to remove the emails and websites criminals use to commit fraud and cyber crime.

- 1: Forward suspicious emails to report@ phishing.gov.uk . Send emails to this address that feel suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam we can check.
- 2: Forward suspicious text messages to 7726 (it's free of charge). Your provider can find out where the text came from and block or ban the sender.
- 3 If you've lost money or provided personal information as a result of a phishing scam, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. In Scotland, call Police Scotland on 101.

News from Castle Bromwich Historic Gardens



▶ Whatever the weather this August it's good to be able to get outside, stretch the legs and look up at the wide blue? sky.

We're lucky to have so many trees and pockets of green in Castle Brom. as well as across the council and road boundaries into Castle Vale and Hodge Hill. They all help make our visual landscape more pleasant and of course continue to help absorb all the pollutants we continue to pour into the atmosphere.

The Gardens Trust tries to do its bit to maintain the many many mature trees and valued habitats of the formal historic Gardens. The Trust also works with the owner (Birmingham City Council) of the 30 acres of Parkland beyond the Gardens. The Historic Parkland, sometimes called 'Lady Brads' is protected and surrounded on all sides by fast roads and the 'collector road'

Considering it's awkward urban position the Parkland is still home to a growing range of wildlife – with even muntjac deer being spotted regularly. Since the Trust started working on restoring the natural habitats on the Parkland there has been a marked improvement in the number of bird species observed and further surveys on the plant varieties and water habitats are indicating quite rapid improvements after decades of neglect.

It is really pleasing that the Parkland is being enjoyed by more people now that the paths have been opened up a bit and the area is less intimidating. This summer however we are particularly on the alert for fire. The fire brigade have already had to be called to douse fires on the area and we urge users of the area to remember that even a dropped match can start something awful.


August Garden opening times extended.



August Update

▶ I am delighted to announce that the Department of Transport has again extended the Government's £2 bus fare cap until October 2023. This will be succeeded by a longer-term fare cap of £2.50 running from 1 November 2023 to 30 November 2024. The cap encompasses local bus routes, including the 71, 94, 96, X12 and X13. In Castle Bromwich, buses are the most relied upon form of public transport, and being able to ensure that bus travel remains affordable and accessible is of the utmost importance. To make sure this is achieved the government has committed £300 million to the long-term recovery of the bus sector until 2025 and another £200 million to help with cost-ofliving pressures. It is also important that we keep working towards our net-zero transport network and to this end, zero-emission buses have been deployed and will hopefully become the standard within our community.

As you know I have been campaigning for better access to quality healthcare for my constituents, this is why I am welcoming the government's plan for the NHS. The Long-Term NHS Workforce Strategy was announced in July 2023 and aims to alleviate the issues faced by the NHS by increasing the number of staff and reforming the way the service is run. This marks the biggest reform to the NHS workforce in its 75-year history. The strategy sets out £2.4 billion worth of funding over the next five years, aimed at additional education and training places. By 2037 there will be an extra 60,000 doctors, 170,000 nurses and 71,000 healthcare professionals. This

significant increase in the NHS workforce will reduce patient waiting times, making healthcare more accessible.

The strategy is also focused on retaining current NHS workers by increasing flexible working, creating more opportunities for professional development, and ensuring that the NHS remains a fulfilling and rewarding workplace. The plan will reform the NHS by placing an emphasis on using technology and innovation to modernise the way healthcare is delivered. This will allow staff to spend more time with patients, providing the best quality of care available.

I believe that these reforms will secure the future of healthcare in this country and help to alleviate the long waiting times people are facing for treatment. A modernisation of the NHS has been necessary to improve how healthcare is delivered and to provide the essential help needed by NHS staff.

The announcement of the NHS Long-Term Workforce plan comes just after the opening of a new Urgent Treatment Centre in Solihull. The new centre was opened in June, following campaigning by the Solihull and Meriden Conservatives including myself, who pushed for better access to healthcare for people across the Solihull Borough. The UTC offers medical services for minor injuries and minor illnesses and is run by different healthcare professionals, including emergency nurse practitioners and GPs. This offers local people an accessible healthcare service for those who do not need to go to A & E. Scott Bevan History Column:

'Old Tommy' kept boyhood promise

This months history column is sourced from an article first published in the Castle Bromwich Advertiser in May of 1956. It details a little bit about the life of a gentleman named Mr Thomas Rhodes who was born in and was also a long term resident of Castle Bromwich. I think we are all very much aware that modern day life is very different to those lives lived by generations past, but I find this article absolutely fascinating as an insight into the life of a Castle Bromwich resident born in the latter part of the 19th century and his attempts to better the lives of those around him.

From the CASTLE BROMWICH ADVERTISER, May 1956....

"When 81 years old Mr Thomas Rhodes, of 185, Water Orton Road, Castle Bromwich, used to go to Birmingham as a young lad the sight which struck him most was that of small children running the streets in bare feet and dressed only in rags and tatters. Says Mr Rhodes: 'I vowed and declared then that I would do my best for both the old and young in the years to come', and he kept that promise. In the past 20 years he has collected more than £700 for Father Hudson's Homes, Coleshill. At the 'Coach and Horses' hotel Castle Bromwich, the figure of 'Old Tommy' as he is always called became familiar with all the customers as each week he took round the collecting box.

"Mr Rhodes is a man who can truly be said to belong to Castle Bromwich. He was born in a little house near the Green on December 21st 1874 and claims he is the oldest native of the village. His mother died when he was two years old. She left a family of six children. His father

although earning only 16 shillings a week as a road man, (his territory stretched from the 'Fox and Goose' to 'Stonebridge') paid 3d a week for each of his children to go to the village school, the school that is still in use adjoining the village Green. Before he set off to school in the morning Thomas would go to the Bradford Arms, which in those days was a farm as well as a public house, to fetch the pails of skimmed milk for the family.

"At 11 years of age he was out at work, earning 6d for a 12 hour day at Mitchell's Farm, Shard End. He had 'the audacity' to ask for a rise after 12 months and was rewarded with an extra shilling a week. At 14 he was old enough for factory work. He walked three miles to Bromford Wire Mills every day and earned himself 5/6d a week. For the wage of 4.50d an hour he worked on the scheme which brought sewage to Water Orton, but later he became a railwayman and stayed in that job for more than 20 years.

"Mr Rhodes this week recalled the days when he and his stepmother picked flowers from the land in Castle Bromwich and sold them in the Bull Ring, Birmingham. It used to cost 3d to put each basket down in the Bull Ring and you made sure you sold all your flowers within two hours, otherwise you had to pay another 3d. The only butchers shop in the village in those days was in Old Chester Road, where 'The Gables' now stands.

"An interesting link between the Rhodes family and Castle Bromwich is provided by the fenced off tree which stands at the Hall Road crossroads. Lady Bradford had the tree specially planted after she had come to Castle Bromwich from London after her marriage and the planting of the tree was accomplished by Mr Rhodes father.

"Castle Bromwich has changed a lot since Mr Rhodes was born. What does he think of the change? 'Well it suits the people of today but it doesn't suit me'. But he admits the good old days were really hard times. When Mr Rhodes was born for instance, his father had to walk all the way to Coleshill to fetch the nearest doctor, Dr Wall, a well known figure in those parts. The old water filled sand pit on the green was an ideal spot for winter skating, Mr Rhodes remembers the opportunity for earning a copper or two for putting on the ladies skates. "Mr Rhodes will be remembered for his work with the Trades and Labour Council at Coleshill, of which he was president for a number of years".

After reading the article I wondered what Thomas would make of modern day Castle Bromwich? Barely recognisable as the village he would've known, I'm sure. Gone are the fields, meadows and pastures and in their place stand shops and houses, footpaths and roads. Still. To quote Old Tommy himself, it most probably suits the people of today, however, I doubt very much that it would've suited him.








The keepsake by Julie Brooks





The refurbished toddler play area at Arden Hall is now officially open!

Solution Castle Bromwich Parish Council has revamped their toddler play area which now features a shipwreck structure, parent and toddler swing, hammock swing, springers, activities and balancing items, all designed with inclusivity in mind. The play area was funded by the Parish Council and designed and installed by one of Europe's largest playground manufacturers, Proludic.

Chairman Councillor Pauline Allen was there to cut the ribbon and welcome the young children to their new play area.

Phase 2 is planned for next year, which will see a new and improved Junior area for older children. The park is open 8:30am to 8pm daily over the summer, so come down and try it out!









The height of summer

We are now at the height of summer and water may be lacking... no don't laugh – even if we've had weeks of rain the ground can easily become parched at this time of year, and as we know tomatoes really hate it when they go from dry to wet too often..

Grass and lawns

Lack of water will reduce the speed at which the grass grows. It still needs the occasional cut, but we often leave our grass a little longer in summer as cutting it too short can stress the grass - a major cause of lawns turning brown. As a general rule don't remove more than a third of the height when mowing and your lawn will remain greener for longer. If you have done any grass seed downing or turf laying in the spring, ensure that you keep it watered; it is still a bit delicate.

Hedges

We have a lot of hedging in the Gardens and by August it is ready for its second cut of the season. The timing of box hedge cutting has to be carefully managed. If it's too sunny the newly cut leaves burn in the sun. A dry overcast day is ideal for us gardeners to perform our cutting but we find it is the clearing up of the cuttings that takes the time! If you want to get a perfectly level hedging erect a string line with a couple of bamboo canes at either end, you can then cut to the level of the line and ensure all dips wonky edges are removed. Cutting for prolonged periods often leads to dips in concentration, so following a line makes it so much easier.

Until this season the Gardens have managed to avoid the dreaded Box Tree Moth Cydalima perspectalis which can totally devastate box trees and hedges, which would be a real (and expensive) disaster for our Gardens if it takes hold. Climate change and deregulated or careless importation of plants (with the larvae onboard) has caused a speed up of the spread of the moth. We'll be following organic guidelines and research from Europe, where the moth has been for sometime, to try to keep the infestation under control. Our Gardeners have already begun to introduce a 'biological weapon' of nemotodes – these are are microscopic creatures, that act as parasites on other insects. They release bacteria into the host's body to kill them. The nematode then eats the host. Gruesome- but 'natural'. We continue to look at a variety of ways of tackling the problems... but if you see 'webbing' in our box hedges in the Gardens, don't touch them – you don't want to be transferring any bugs to other places ..

Vegetables

August is the month for harvesting those crops that needed a bit of warmth and care earlier in the season. Cucumbers, aubergines and tomatoes are now ready to be picked and eaten. Main crop potatoes are now lifted and can be stored, keep them cool and dry but don't put them in the fridge as you could end up with sweet gritty potatoes as the starch contained within them turns to sugar.

Lastly we are now at the height of summer so remember to sit back and relax occasionally and enjoy the fruits of your labour!








Park Hall Futures day



An Introduction to St Mary & St Margaret Church



▶ Up here at Castle Bromwich Parish Church we are still very much missing our dear friend, local historian Bill Dargue.

He sadly died on the last day of last year and of course we all continue to think of his widow Joan and their family.

Bill was a Southport lad who came down to Teacher Training College in Saltley and put down his roots in Castle Bromwich.

He became passionately interested in the history of our area in general and in the church of St Mary & St Margaret in particular.

For years he was also Captain of the Bell Ringing team and he never stopped delving into the fascinating story of our unique church building.

By contrast I am a Brummie and I first discovered the church on an expedition from Small Heath into the "countryside" on my trusty Hercules touring model. I wouldn't have been much above twelve so it would have been around 1948.

I can't pretend to remember details, but I was not a long distance cyclist and my legs have always been short, so I do remember the long winding pull up the very heavily wooded Old Chester Road hill. I think I got off for a drink at the spring in the hedgerow and walked the rest.

I was so glad to emerge into "civilisation" at the graveyard wall and to see the sign on the bend

"- Castle Bromwich -" That sign is still there - on my now, front garden wall.

Of course, there is no way I can claim that, at twelve I knew I was going to be an architect, but I do remember thinking the building I guessed to be a church was very

unusual to say the least and wondering how long it had been there.

Little did I know either how much it would feature in my life. That - as they say - is another story!

When I discovered Castle Bromwich 75 years ago, I also didn't know I had entered in the same way that travellers had done for hundreds of years before me.

It is a cul-de-sac now, but the old Chester Road was one of the country's ancient "saltways". Traders in that essential commodity from pre-historic times, coming from the Cheshire saltmines to the south, had no option but to cross through the marshes of the meandering River Tame, to find the only fording place for miles in either direction.

They then had to climb the wooded escarpment, forming the northern edge of the Forest of Arden, and find themselves in what is now Castle Bromwich!

During the Roman occupation of Britain, they established a garrison at Coleshill to enforce their rule in the area. Commercial and other traffic using the old Chester Road must have grown to quite a volume and recognising the strategic importance of the river crossing they set up a checkpoint on the high ground to observe movement. This would enable them to sense any potentially dangerous trends and perhaps levy a tax or two from the passing traders.

With the dangers of the travel in those times, it is feasible that the Romans also set up or added to a roadside shrine where offerings for safe passage could be made. Is this the basis for our Parish Church?

When I'm Sixty-Four

When do you know that it's time to give your body a rest and stop working? And is just knowing enough?

Sadly, for many people the choice to carry on working into old age is no longer a choice but a need. Even when it is physically and mentally draining to get up each morning, get ready and find that motivation to

go to work, many still do.

There may be several reasons for this.

- You have not yet reached the retirement age when you would be eligible for the state pension.
- You cannot survive on your work pension alone. This might be because you have not paid into it for enough years.
- You still have the burden of making mortgage payments because paying it off early was not possible.
- You are used to a lifestyle where having less money than what your job provides would mean going without.
- Or simply, you have no savings, nothing to fall back on, and no-one else to turn to when you need to.

We work all our lives. We help and support our children. We give them what they want and what they need so they don't have to go without. We do what we can to make ends meet through the good times and the bad. I say 'we' because I am referring to the majority of people. Many people will reach an age when they should stop working but find that they cannot because having to manage without that pay packet is not possible.

Being part of a couple makes life a bit easier. You know you have each other to rely on. However, as you get closer to retirement, survival can be much harder if you are having to manage financially on your own. This depends, of course, on the circumstances that have surrounded your life and where you have worked. Some workplace pensions offer a generous lump sum payout plus a decent pension. But not everyone will be in a position to receive this.

And life is tough. We live in a day and age when there are significant essentials that we cannot go without. A car, a mobile phone, a computer, a holiday now and then, and nice clothes. And these are the needs that come after our basic needs of food, warmth, and shelter.

This is why it is so important to have a decent pension when you retire. Maybe you have worked in several places throughout your life. Those little pension pots you have lying around can easily be transferred into one place. Don't forget about them or let them go. If you cannot trace them yourself there are people who will do it for you. So many people will be unaware of what they actually have in pension funds because they overlook some of the jobs they have done in the past. Chase them up.

Young people will probably be of the opinion that retirement is far off in the distance. But it will creep up on you and before you know it, it will be time to start thinking about taking your pension. Don't let that time be one that you will regret. Do something about it now. This applies especially to those who are self-employed and making pension contributions seems to be just another expense, but it is one that you should seriously think about sooner rather than later.

Not only this but those in self-employment often fail to make enough national insurance contributions which means that the state pension will be out of reach too. This really concerns me. Young people who are self-employed and not at all concerned about paying their national insurance contributions or paying anything towards a pension. Don't put yourself in a position where retirement will be a time of hardship.

If you are employed by a company your employer has a legal obligation to make payments into your pension on your behalf. This is the law and is set at 3% from the employer and 8% from the employees' salary each month. Plus, if you are a basic rate taxpayer (20%), you will automatically get full tax relief from the government. This means that if you pay £100 a month into your pension, £20 of this will the governments contribution. Check if your employer is making these payments as required by law.

I guess the purpose of this article is to raise awareness about the importance of thinking about your pension as early as you can. As soon as you start working, it's time to start paying into a pension fund. It is never too early and, believe me, you will be so glad you did when the time comes to put your feet up and take it easy.











Each summer, in the village of Water Orton, Val got together different teachers to share practices and the money raised divided between a local special-educational needs school in Coleshill (then called Blythe School now Woodlands) and other local charities that students had put forward.

which has been held at Water Orton primary school and Shustoke village hall.

So, for 4-6 weeks every year we have wonderful teachers from around the Midlands come and teach, with all donations from students going to their chosen charities. We have welcomed all schools and styles and over the years have enjoyed everything from Sivananda to Iyengar, Yin to Vinyasa, sound baths to Ashtanga, Yoga Nidra to Tibetan chanting and Qigong.

Since 2005 alone these sessions have raised over £10,000 for local charities – we have welcomed hundreds of students of Yoga through our doors and many, many wonderful teachers of Yoga.

Retro-fit trees into housing estates to bring nature back, charity to tell councils



The 48 local nature recovery areas and responsible authorities are listed in notes to editors.

The Woodland Trust will challenge councils to bring back nature to the places we live* as councillors and officers converge on the Local Government Association (LGA) Conference in Bournemouth today.

The charity will present its new report - Trees and Woods at the Heart of Nature Recovery in England - to delegates which sets out a raft of solutions, including adding more trees into housing estates with less than 16% tree cover, 30% canopy cover for new developments, and access to greenspace within 10 minutes of everyone's doorsteps. To coincide with the launch, the Trust is urging people to back its campaign calling on councillors to take urgent action for nature.

The report, designed to help councils and communities write their Local Nature Recovery Strategies, follows the Government's announcement on Friday that is has made £14m available to the 48 local authorities tasked with leading on drafting the plans.

Ecologist Louise Wilkinson, Nature Recovery Lead at the Woodland Trust who co-authored the report, said:

"We recognise the enormous strain on local authority budgets and wrote this report to offer a helping hand on how to surmount the challenge of rapid declines in nature. This year the Government handed local authorities the task of involving communities in writing Local Nature Recovery Strategies. This is a golden chance for communities to map out what they want to see, where to bring nature back, and crucially, to embed this in local policy. It's a tough task so we have published the top steps that should be incorporated."

Since 1970, 35% of species have declined in abundance. This means today's children now have a 70% less chance of seeing a hedgehog than their parents did, while dormice populations have fallen 48% since today's primary school pupils were born. The proportion of urban green space is also declining**

Responsibility to turn the tide rests with local authorities as well as national government. As part of the 2021 Environment Act, the Government is tasking designated local authorities to develop Local Nature Recovery Strategies bespoke to their areas – an action required by law. These plans are designed to be easy to grasp and are geared to reflect the views of local people on where they want to see areas of nature-rich space for public use.

Darren Moorcroft, chief executive of the Woodland Trust, explained why trees are vital:

"Trees and woods are critical in creating better, healthier places for people to live and all communities should have access to these benefits. As well as driving nature's return, tree numbers correlate to improving people's health and well-being – something that's being increasingly recognised by leaders across the globe. This is why our report calls for councils to ensure more trees on new and existing housing estates as well as improved access to woodland, so that trees and woods can benefit their residents and nature alike."

To help ensure these plans are placed high on agendas, the Woodland Trust is asking people to contact their local authorities via its campaign website. The e-action will demand that local authorities declare a nature crisis. It is estimated that while 80% of councils have declared a climate emergency, fewer than 15% that have declared a nature crisis.

Dr Moorcroft, continues:

"We have launched our campaign that takes two clicks to let your local authority know you want it to declare a nature emergency. We know many people feel unheard but we're asking them not to underestimate the power of lending their weight to campaigns that challenge elected politicians to listen. Our report is focussed on solutions, not panic. There are answers to the crisis we face. We just need action – and it can be done."


