



- Are you passionate about your community?
- Do you want to help make a long-lasting change?

- Do you have concerns about a specific issue and want to do something about it?

If this is you, then we need you at Castle Bromwich Parish Council. We need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect their community to put themselves forward for election. Make a change and become a councillor.

What do local councils and councillors do?

Parish councils and councillors make a massive difference to local people's quality of life. They are the first tier of governance and are the first point of contact for anyone concerned with a community issue. They are also passionate about their communities and seek to make a change to help improve their residents' lives.

Local councils run numerous services, depending on the size of the council. Many of them you will see day-to-day, but some are less known. These include setting up community groups, organising facilities for sports, recreation, and social events, making comments on local planning applications before being submitted to SMBC, looking at traffic schemes to address congestion, parking, speeding, etc., establishing youth projects, and managing open spaces.

Councillors are elected to represent the local community, so you must either live or work in the council area. Becoming a councillor is a rewarding experience as you will be able to make a change in your community to help improve residents' lives. A councillor's role can include developing strategies and plans for the area, helping with problems and ideas, representing the community, working with other local community groups, decision making and reviewing decisions and talking to the community about their needs and what the council is doing.

How to become a councillor

A Parish Council can only be as helpful, connected and energetic as the people elected to run them, so we need councillors capable, enthusiastic and engaged to reflect their communities. You can find out more about becoming a

councillor on The Electoral Commission and Local Government Association website. There are three ways that you can become a councillor; standing for election, filling a vacant seat after an election (coopted) or filling a casual vacancy.

Hats off to school principal Nicola Steele, and here's to the next 20 years!





A Freemasons Lodge on behalf of the Oliver King Foundation Present a Defibrillator to Melbicks Garden Centre

On Thursday 11th April 2024, the Masonic Lodge of Fellowship 6707, which meets every third Wednesday in the months of October, November, December, January, February, March and April at Kings Heath Masonic Hall, presented a defibrillator to Melbicks Garden Centre. This was on behalf of "The Oliver King Foundation".

Oliver King was a normal, sports loving, 12-year-old lad, who collapsed and died from a cardiac arrest while at school following a swimming lesson. If there had been a defibrillator at the school, there was a good chance, he could have survived.

Since that day, his father Mark, has made it his mission to make it compulsory for every school in the UK to have a defibrillator. Every year, approximately 600 young people, under the age of 35, die from Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome (SADS), a hidden heart condition that can affect the fittest of people.

Mark King, Oliver's father, presented the defibrillator, to Mr Adam Mountford, General Manager at Melbicks Garden Centre. The defibrillator was donated, on behalf of The Masonic Lodge of Fellowship 6707. A number of the Lodges' Brethren, namely, W.Bro Alan Mack, W.Bro Colin Ford and W.Bro John Smith attended the presentation.

Due to the success of Mark King's quest, that every school in the country will have a defibrillator on their premises. The Masonic Lodge of Fellowship 6707 are currently preparing to donate another defibrillator, but this time, to a "Care Centre" in Erdington, Birmingham.

The growing season is getting off to a slow start and we are all longing for sunshine and warmer weather! Things are beginning to happen however and our cherry and plum trees are beginning to show some beautiful blossoms. We are hoping there will be no frost as this can damage them and prevent as much fruit forming later in the season. We have already begun to harvest some rhubarb which we make delicious crumbles with and this will increase as we move in spring.

Our seed potatoes will be planted out this month. As they grow, we have to earth the potatoes up by piling earth around the plant's shoots to protect from frost but also to allow the potatoes that are forming underground to be protected from light as this turns them green. Beetroot, tomatoes, lettuce, kale and cabbage seeds have been sown and these are beginning to germinate. Beans and courgettes will be sown later this month as these are more tender plants and can't be planted out until

Our pond has plenty of frogspawn in it so we should have lots of tadpoles. Hopefully the frogs will help with any slug problem as slugs are one of their favourite foods!

St Clements opened The Mary Bridgeman Tea and Coffee Lounge on Monday 8th April from 9.30 am 12.30 am. Some of vou may remember The Oasis Café that we ran from 2012 until 2020. St Clements Church was built after the people of Castle Bromwich came together in the 1940's and raised the money to build a Church on land that was given by the Earl of Bradford at that time. The Mary Bridgeman Tea and Coffee Lounge is the next step on that amazing journey, one which was started all those many years ago. Where will the next 50 years take them? Who knows!

May update

Dear Resident

In March the Chancellor unveiled the Spring Budget, announcing changes to the high-income child benefit system. Having spoken to the Chancellor about the pressure families are facing I am so pleased that over 12,000 families within the Meriden constituency will be positively impacted by these changes. The benefit will be amended to consider household income instead of individual income as was the previous practice. In real terms, this means that families with 2 children, previously receiving no child benefit could receive an extra £2,212 per year and a family with three children could receive an extra £3,094 per year. In adapting the child benefit system, the government aims to keep more families' money in their pockets and make the system more equitable. The extra money families will receive will be a lifeline to help them deal with additional costs and to support more parents back into work.

Improving healthcare provisions within the Solihull borough continues to be one of my main priorities. Through several successful campaigns, I have secured an Urgent Treatment Centre (UTC) at Solihull Hospital and a suite of new state-of-the-art surgical suites. The

UTC offers medical services for minor injuries and illnesses, 7 days a week, for those who do not need to access A&E. The introduction of these facilities is added to by the opening of a Community Diagnostic Centre in Chelmsley Wood, helping to ease pressure on GP appointments by providing 116,000 tests, checks and scans. I have always championed healthcare in my constituency and will continue to do so.

I am continuing to fight against the closure of the Solihull police station and the removal of the front desk at Chelmsley Wood police station. The Labour Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) is continuing with these closures against the will of residents. I am deeply disappointed in this decision as I believe that a visible police presence is needed to deter crime and ensure that residents are confident in the police's ability to serve them effectively. With record government funding for the West Midlands police and over 1,300 new police officers, there is no excuse for the failure to provide a plan to secure both police stations. I am committed to keeping our community safe and I will continue to campaign on this issue.


A great twisting psychological thriller. It's fast paced and unpredictable and had me guessing right up to the last page. I will be looking for more books by this author.

At the end of the previous article, I arbitrarily placed the date of building the last feature of the medieval church, that is the Western Not long after this he was administering tower and spire, at 1509, the year of the accession of Henry VIII.

History is shaped by the "prime movers" of the ages and in this article I wish to touch on some of those who have affected Castle Bromwich

In 1509 the manor was owned by the Lords Ferrer whose seat was at Chartley in Staffordshire.

At that time the holder of the title was Walter Devereaux.

The Devereaux had come to England with William the Conquerer and had settled in the Welsh Marches - Weobley in Herefordshire.

Walter had married Anne the Ferrers heiress in 1450. Their son, John, married the sister of the last Bourchier Earl of Essex thereby adding to his title the names of Bourchier and Lovaine.

In 1509 Walter Devereaux (II) was 24 years old. Four years earlier he had married the sister of the Marquis of Dorset. He was working his way up the hierarchy of Henry VIII's court for the next few years.

In 1525 he was made a Knight of the Garter and became Chancellor of Princess Mary Tudor's household at Ludlow Castle.

the disposal of monastic buildings and estates as part of the Dissolution of these establishments. From this he accrued considerable wealth.

In 1541 his grandson, also Walter, was born but also, sadly, his first wife died. Subsequently he remarried in and in 1545 his youngest son, Edward, was born -Walter (II) was 60 years old at this time.

In 1550 he was created Viscount Hereford but in 1558 he died aged 73 - Queen Elizabeth I came to the throne later in the

The first Viscount Hereford was succeeded by his grandson – also Walter (III) – who also came to the Royal Court and became a favourite of the Queen.

In 1561, aged 20 he married Lettice, the daughter of Sir Francis Knollys, one of the Queen's chief ministers. This didn't please Elizabeth and she hated Lettice, as a rival for Walter's affections. He and his bride retreated to Chartley Manor where they produced five children – one died in



The heir to the Hereford title, Robert, was born in 1567. Two years later Sir Walter was required to raise troops to guard Mary Queen of Scots when she was held at Tutbury Castle near Chartley.

In 1572 he became a Garter Knight and subsequently Earl of Essex - "of the 6th Creation"- following his Bourchier ancestors.

The young Earl (31) needed to further his ambitions with Royal Service and volunteered to colonize the Northern parts of Ireland, sharing the costs with the Queen.

I think that to help raise funds he sold the Manor of Castle Bromwich to his (younger) half-uncle Edward, subject to a lifetime interest for the latter's mother -



exam stress and build resilience for the future.

Provide Emotional Support: It can be difficult for children to talk about their feelings. Support your child to know it ok to share their worries, and provide an ear to listen and shoulder to lean on. Encourage your child to notice their emotions and use strategies to keep their anxieties in check. For example, relaxation, distraction, breathing exercises. Building the self-awareness to understand mental health will support your child to feel confident to manage their own emotional wellbeing as they make the transition into adulthood.

Manage Expectations and Keep **Perspective:** Support your child to set realistic goals and expectations. If your child finds exams difficult and starts to views themselves through a self-critical lens encourage them to be compassionate, problem-solve and identify ways to seek support. As parents we want our children to succeed, and at times, we might need to be mindful about how we respond to setbacks. Take time to understand your child difficulties rather than being critical or compare them to peers. Encourage your child to remain focused on their efforts and progress rather than becoming bogged down by the pressure to achieve the perfect grade.

Healthy Body, Healthy Mind:

Mental health and physical health are interconnected. Exercise can boost energy levels, act as a distraction from studies,

healthy mind, and improves concentration and memory. Support your child to build sleep routines, allowing time to wind down from their studies to engage in activities that promote sleep including reading, relaxation, a warm bath.

Take a Break: It's easy to fall into the trap that 'more is more' and non-stop studying will led to exam success. However, incorporating regular breaks can support learning and memory retention. Support your child to take regular breaks and plan time away from the revision guides to enjoy activities and spend time with friends and family. A balanced diet is vital for your child's wellbeing, and planning regular break will provide an opportunity to maintain a healthy diet.

Celebrate: Celebrate your child's efforts and progress throughout the exam period. Praise their hard work and resilience, and let them know that you're proud of them no matter what.

For some young people exams might coincidence with other challenges and worries, making it difficult to cope. If you are concerned about your child's mental health it is important to seek professional support. Fungal Infections

May is fungal awareness month, so we though to explain and show you all fungal skin infections that can be affected in your feet.

What it is and what it looks like:

A fungal nail can present itself in a number of ways. It can appear yellow/white or brown in colour and sometimes the nail can grow thick. In some cases, part of the nail can become loose meaning debris can gather behind it. Sometimes, it can just appear as a patch and other times the whole nail can be affected. It can affect one or multiple nails on either foot.



How to treat it:

There are a few different treatment options available depending on the severity of your infection. In most cases we recommend a nail lacquer called amorolfine which you apply weekly to the infected nail. Alternatively, you can use Emtrix once a day - ideally at night. Both treatments can be successful but only if applied regularly, as they can take 9-12 months for the fungus to clear and see the results. You can purchase both products from us.



Another treatment option would be a tablet called terbinafine. However, this tablet is very strong and can have side effects

so is only reserved for very severe infections.

We also offer a treatment called the Lacuna Method which involves drilling small holes in the nail plate and spraying an anti-fungal treatment directly onto the nail bed, allowing the anti-fungal solution to penetrate to the nail bed where the fungal infection is.

With all treatments we recommend regular routine Podiatry treatments to thin the nail and monitor the infection. We can use digital photographs to monitor the treatment's progress.

If you are unsure which treatment would be the most beneficial for you, you can book in with one of our Podiatrists who can give you the appropriate

Gardener's Tips for May

It is now time to give your borders some attention. All the sunshine means the garden should now be at its vibrant best. Remove any faded spring bedding at the end of the month, it's served you well but it's time for a change and old bedding can be put in the compost bin to go back on the garden next year as mulch. Once the risk of frost has passed, plant out summer bedding and ensure it is kept well watered so it can establish. Ensure any perennial weeds are swiftly removed and hoe off any annual weeds, ensure they don't get the chance to flower and seed as this will greatly increase your workload. Tie in any shoots of climbing plants in your border plants like clematis are easier to manage when offshoots are short and young, if you allow them to get too long it's almost impossible to prise them away from other plants they get tangled up in without

If you want hanging baskets plant them up now and allow them to establish for a few weeks in a frost free space make sure that when you put them out you keep them well watered, pick off the dead flowers and give them a liquid fertiliser feed every few weeks this should keep your hanging baskets flowering throughout the summer.

You can start to harvest rhubarb this month, twist the stem at the base of the plant but ensure you leave a few stems on each crown. Don't strip it bare as the plant needs to be able to feed its own crown. Continuing with this theme on the vegetable plot, if you have asparagus ensure that you stop cutting to leave some spears to grow at the end of the month. They produce a lovely ferny foliage which is needed by the asparagus crown to capture sunlight to replenish its crown for next year. Potatoes that were planted in April can now be earthed up, by drawing up mounds of soil up around the plant this will help the potatoes create more tubers from the buried stems and increase your crop.

How about going for a NO Mow May

The international conservation organisation Plantlife's annual campaign advises you to leave your lawns and open spaces uncut for May. A rainbow of wildflowers in your lawn doesn't just look pretty, but it's also the sign of a healthy and thriving garden. Gp to their website https://www.plantlife.org.uk/) for good advice on increasing the beneficial wildflowers in your gardens After May don't forget to go slowly with the mower with your first June cuts: that grass and those

wildflower seed heads can be tough on your machine blades.



Why NoMow May? We've lost nearly 97% of flower rich meadows since the 1970's and with them gone are vital food needed by pollinators, like bees and butterflies.

A healthy lawn with some long grass and wildflowers benefits wildlife, tackles pollution and can even lock away carbon below ground – and best of all, to reap these benefits all you have to do is not mow your lawn in May!

There are over 20 million gardens in the UK so even the smallest grassy patch adds up to a significant proportion of land which, if managed properly, can deliver enormous gains for nature, communities and the climate.

The Gardens are obliged to maintain the manner and style of the Gardens from over 350 years ago - which was certainly less concerned with conserving the 'natural and the wild than we are. But we nevertheless embrace #NoMowMay in our wilder areas, but have to cut the main lawn to keep the grass healthy and accessible for you visitors. Even so we continue to do as much as we can to naturally attract bees and insects to the Gardens... for the benefit of us all on this planet.






