



Hats off to school principal Nicola Steele, and here's to the next 20 years!





A Freemasons Lodge on behalf of the Oliver King Foundation Present a Defibrillator to Melbicks Garden Centre

On Thursday 11th April 2024, the Masonic Lodge of Fellowship 6707, which meets every third Wednesday in the months of October, November, December, January, February, March and April at Kings Heath Masonic Hall, presented a defibrillator to Melbicks Garden Centre. This was on behalf of "The Oliver King Foundation".

Oliver King was a normal, sports loving, 12-year-old lad, who collapsed and died from a cardiac arrest while at school following a swimming lesson. If there had been a defibrillator at the school, there was a good chance, he could have survived.

Since that day, his father Mark, has made it his mission to make it compulsory for every school in the UK to have a defibrillator. Every year, approximately 600 young people, under the age of 35, die from Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome (SADS), a hidden heart condition that can affect the fittest of people.

Mark King, Oliver's father, presented the defibrillator, to Mr Adam Mountford, General Manager at Melbicks Garden Centre. The defibrillator was donated, on behalf of The Masonic Lodge of Fellowship 6707. A number of the Lodges' Brethren, namely, W.Bro Alan Mack, W.Bro Colin Ford and W.Bro John Smith attended the presentation.

Due to the success of Mark King's quest, that every school in the country will have a defibrillator on their premises. The Masonic Lodge of Fellowship 6707 are currently preparing to donate another defibrillator, but this time, to a "Care Centre" in Erdington, Birmingham.




Fellow grower, Diane, and I have been collecting seeds for some months and pulled together some ideas for sustainable alternatives for plastic in our growing spaces. We reached out to Sutton Seeds ahead of the seed swap, and they generously donated an array of seeds to our event, including wildflower seeds for encouraging pollinators, and seeds to grow around wildlife ponds.

Tenants from across the Coleshill allotment sites attended the meeting to discuss events from 2023 and raise any concerns or requests to the Town Council for the year ahead. They brought with them seeds, plants, and even trees to swap. Coleshill Mayor, Tony Battle, also attended the event and was inspired to give growing his own food a try! It was a lovely evening, spent exchanging seeds, gossip and handy tips with likeminded individuals over tea and biscuits.

Buying seeds can become a costly exercise, and so community seed swaps are a great way for like-minded people to bring along their spare seeds and swap them! As someone with magazine subscriptions to gardening magazines, I often get seeds like cabbage and chard in my magazines, which I don't grow on my plot so it's great to know someone else will benefit from them!

Seeds which weren't swapped at the AGM will be kept for our next seed swap event, and any leftover will be donated to local primary schools and charities. If you are from a local school or charity and would like be considered for a donation of the seeds, please contact the Coleshill Town Council in the first instance.



- Toilet paper cores make great seed pots, and can be planted straight into pots or the ground once the plant is ready to be potted on.
- Coir coins and blocks make for easy storage even in the smallest of spaces, and can be planted straight into pots or the ground and will biodegrade.
- Wool pots are growing in popularity and can be used for growing seeds and seedlings.
- Lollipop sticks and wooden discs make great alternatives to plastic plant labels, and can be decorated to make a pretty addition to any growing space.
- Egg cartons can be used as alternatives to modular seed trays. Things to grow this month:
- This month I have popped in a new set of seed potatoes, to ensure that I have a continuous supply. Later harvests will be stored in paper or hessian sacks in a cool, dark place to keep and use through the winter months
- Sweetcorn and peas can be sown now, they like to have room for their roots to grow and toilet roll or kitchen roll cores make a great alternative to deep root trainer trays.
- Pumpkins can be sown now if you have limited space to grow, consider miniature varieties such as Baby Boo and grow them vertically up an arch or trellis and make a feature of them.
- Salad leaves are relatively quick growers and can be enjoyed throughout the warmer months. (Lettuce leaves can be picked as needed, and new leaves will continue grow if you leave the plant in the ground.)
- Beetroot can be sown directly into the ground, or into deeper seed trays for smaller plants, and the leaves can be added to salads.
- Calendula and nasturtium seeds as companion plants, to draw away pests from my vegetable seedlings and plants.

Missing Buildings and Spaces 12

There are many places and roads in Coleshill that have changed so drastically that no one alive today will recognise them. I have selected a view which could have been taken in about 1900. It is at the bottom of Church Hill and the photo is taken from what is now the Fish and Chip Shop. Nothing in the photo remains although the roof on the right could be Blades.



The shop in the right hand corner is Dales. It started as a chemist but developed into a general store. To the left is a private house and further left was the telephone exchange which was used until the new exchange was built below the cross roads.

A photo taken in 1967 shows the start of the development on Church Hill. The co-op have taken over at the corner with the High Street and have built the single story store at the rear of the premises. The Coleshill branch of the co-op was branch number 7, so it was an early branch which was started in about 1900



It would appear that the co-op did well and expanded along the High Street.



The main store has expanded considerably the last window being the butchers. The Co-op as many will remember expanded so that members had no reason to go to any other store, after the 2nd World War my family bought a car from them. In Coleshill they took over a furniture store. Under the name Co-Operative we now have House and Home in the first window and Café on the Hill at the second. They had dry cleaners, now Blades. Before leaving Coleshill to the Funeral Service they moved over the road to take over Summerfields Supermarket, next to Tuckley.





All the articles I have written for the Post have been taken from the Civic Society archives. The items in the Archives are currently catalogued and held in an Access database. However since covid little work has taken place and they need a good 'spring-clean'. If anyone out there would like to become involved with this work please contact me.



Dear Fellow Villagers

Over Easter I was very fortunate to be able to go on holiday. My sister lives in Kansas City and I went over to see her for the first time in nearly 30 years. (She has visited here during that time).

Whilst I was there, there were some local elections.

The differences between the range of questions that were asked lead me to consider a number of questions myself.

For instance, whilst there I was able to access a fantastic new build library which contained amazing engaging resources and was the centre for a lot of activities for all in the community it served.

It was well used and well resourced. I was told that this was the result of a specific sales tax that was implemented locally and had been voted upon by the community.

The direct nature of the engagement with the community in planning and decision making seemed to have a direct impact too on the levels of subsequent level of community use. Where it is known exactly how and why something was paid for suggested that it had more value to those who could access it.

This isn't a posting about libraires per se. Although it should be noted that we wouldn't have a library provision within the village without the vision, commitment and spirit of amazing volunteers.

There are two points that I wish to make. Firstly, when we pay our council tax bills every month just how certain do you think that we are receiving appropriate services from Warwickshire County Council. North Warwickshire Borough Council,

Warwickshire Police and Crime Commissioner and Water Orton Parish Council? Secondly, Do you feel that you have had your views on where money should be spent consulted? Do you think that the village has had a fair deal from the offices in Warwick and Atherstone? Or do you think that the money is being spent on matters of little concern to us and based a long way away?

On Saturday 18th May at the school to engage on village matters. Between 12-5 there is the chance to engage with village organisation and also to suggest what matters should be the priorities for the village going forward. Facilitated by the Parish Council, The Annual Village Gathering is a chance for you to put your voice and thoughts forward to inform future activities.

Its also the chance to engage with village clubs or to suggest clubs and activities you may want to see formed. There will also be the opportunity to learn about volunteering positions too.

When meeting people around the village I think that there is a latent desire out there for things to be better than they are. All too often we are apparently told by others, often based a long way away, what we want as a village – or what we are going to get.

I think that the greatest resource this village has is its residents. This is a great opportunity to positively impact on our community and its environment. I hope to see you there.

Call for an urgent review of vetting of police officers

Rachel Taylor, North Warwickshire and Bedworth Labour Parliamentary Candidate and Sarah Feeney, Labour Police and Crime Commissioner Candidate are calling for a Code of Conduct and mandatory national police standards for vetting all applicants to the police service as soon as possible.

Two Warwickshire Police officers have been in court in 2024 for sexual offences against women. This follows on from Channel 4's Dispatches revealing the scale of sexual misconduct by serving police officers, some concerns reaching back 20 years. This highlights the need for an urgent review of the vetting process of people applying to be police officers.

The police force in Warwickshire has one of the lowest prosecution rates for rape and reporting rates for violence against women and girls. We need women to feel confident to report crimes and ensure that we have police officers of the highest probity to both investigate and support victims of these crimes.

Last year only 15 prosecutions were pursued by Warwickshire police and of these only seven cases resulted in convictions. This cannot continue and women who are victims of sexual crime need to be treated with respect and dignity.

An urgent review is needed. Right now, victims of rape are not likely to report it to the police or have any faith that in Warwickshire, they will get justice. We need to act to give victims their confidence back in the criminal justice system here.

 $Two\ years\ ago,\ Yvette\ Cooper,\ Labour's\ Shadow\ Home\ Secretary\ called\ for\ a\ Code\ of$

Conduct and mandatory national police standards for vetting all applicants to the police service. This can't come soon enough now. This is important for Warwickshire Police which has national responsibility for vetting under its chief constable, the National Police Chiefs' Council lead for vetting.

We need to ensure that women and girls have trust and faith in the police service. The police must be a safe place to report crime and that all women should feel safe in the company of a police officer.

exam stress and build resilience for the future.

Provide Emotional Support: It can be difficult for children to talk about their feelings. Support your child to know it ok to share their worries, and provide an ear to listen and shoulder to lean on. Encourage your child to notice their emotions and use strategies to keep their anxieties in check. For example, relaxation, distraction, breathing exercises. Building the self-awareness to understand mental health will support your child to feel confident to manage their own emotional wellbeing as they make the transition into adulthood.

Manage Expectations and Keep **Perspective:** Support your child to set realistic goals and expectations. If your child finds exams difficult and starts to views themselves through a self-critical lens encourage them to be compassionate, problem-solve and identify ways to seek support. As parents we want our children to succeed, and at times, we might need to be mindful about how we respond to setbacks. Take time to understand your child difficulties rather than being critical or compare them to peers. Encourage your child to remain focused on their efforts and progress rather than becoming bogged down by the pressure to achieve the perfect grade.

Healthy Body, Healthy Mind:

Mental health and physical health are interconnected. Exercise can boost energy levels, act as a distraction from studies,

healthy mind, and improves concentration and memory. Support your child to build sleep routines, allowing time to wind down from their studies to engage in activities that promote sleep including reading, relaxation, a warm bath.

Take a Break: It's easy to fall into the trap that 'more is more' and non-stop studying will led to exam success. However, incorporating regular breaks can support learning and memory retention. Support your child to take regular breaks and plan time away from the revision guides to enjoy activities and spend time with friends and family. A balanced diet is vital for your child's wellbeing, and planning regular break will provide an opportunity to maintain a healthy diet.

Celebrate: Celebrate your child's efforts and progress throughout the exam period. Praise their hard work and resilience, and let them know that you're proud of them no matter what.

For some young people exams might coincidence with other challenges and worries, making it difficult to cope. If you are concerned about your child's mental health it is important to seek professional support. Make an appointment with your GP or contact the Purple House Clinic, a mental health service that offers support to children, adolescents and adults on 0121 820 7851.

Fungal Infections

May is fungal awareness month, so we though to explain and show you all fungal skin infections that can be affected in your feet.

What it is and what it looks like:

A fungal nail can present itself in a number of ways. It can appear yellow/white or brown in colour and sometimes the nail can grow thick. In some cases, part of the nail can become loose meaning debris can gather behind it. Sometimes, it can just appear as a patch and other times the whole nail can be affected. It can affect one or multiple nails on either foot.



How to treat it:

There are a few different treatment options available depending on the severity of your infection. In most cases we recommend a nail lacquer called amorolfine which you apply weekly to the infected nail. Alternatively, you can use Emtrix once a day - ideally at night. Both treatments can be successful but only if applied regularly, as they can take 9-12 months for the fungus to clear and see the results. You can purchase both products from us.



Another treatment option would be a tablet called terbinafine. However, this tablet is very strong and can have side effects

so is only reserved for very severe infections.

We also offer a treatment called the Lacuna Method which involves drilling small holes in the nail plate and spraying an anti-fungal treatment directly onto the nail bed, allowing the anti-fungal solution to penetrate to the nail bed where the fungal infection is.

With all treatments we recommend regular routine Podiatry treatments to thin the nail and monitor the infection. We can use digital photographs to monitor the treatment's progress.

If you are unsure which treatment would be the most beneficial for you, you can book in with one of our Podiatrists who can give you the appropriate

Fungal skin infections:

What is it and what it looks like:

Athletes foot is a fungal infection

Gardener's Tips for May

It is now time to give your borders some attention. All the sunshine means the garden should now be at its vibrant best. Remove any faded spring bedding at the end of the month, it's served you well but it's time for a change and old bedding can be put in the compost bin to go back on the garden next year as mulch. Once the risk of frost has passed, plant out summer bedding and ensure it is kept well watered so it can establish. Ensure any perennial weeds are swiftly removed and hoe off any annual weeds, ensure they don't get the chance to flower and seed as this will greatly increase your workload. Tie in any shoots of climbing plants in your border plants like clematis are easier to manage when offshoots are short and young, if you allow them to get too long it's almost impossible to prise them away from other plants they get tangled up in without

If you want hanging baskets plant them up now and allow them to establish for a few weeks in a frost free space make sure that when you put them out you keep them well watered, pick off the dead flowers and give them a liquid fertiliser feed every few weeks this should keep your hanging baskets flowering throughout the summer.

You can start to harvest rhubarb this month, twist the stem at the base of the plant but ensure you leave a few stems on each crown. Don't strip it bare as the plant needs to be able to feed its own crown. Continuing with this theme on the vegetable plot, if you have asparagus ensure that you stop cutting to leave some spears to grow at the end of the month. They produce a lovely ferny foliage which is needed by the asparagus crown to capture sunlight to replenish its crown for next year. Potatoes that were planted in April can now be earthed up, by drawing up mounds of soil up around the plant this will help the potatoes create more tubers from the buried stems and increase your crop.

How about going for a NO Mow May

The international conservation organisation Plantlife's annual campaign advises you to leave your lawns and open spaces uncut for May. A rainbow of wildflowers in your lawn doesn't just look pretty, but it's also the sign of a healthy and thriving garden. Gp to their website https://www.plantlife.org.uk/) for good advice on increasing the beneficial wildflowers in your gardens After May don't forget to go slowly with the mower with your first June cuts: that grass and those

wildflower seed heads can be tough on your machine blades.



Why NoMow May? We've lost nearly 97% of flower rich meadows since the 1970's and with them gone are vital food needed by pollinators, like bees and butterflies.

A healthy lawn with some long grass and wildflowers benefits wildlife, tackles pollution and can even lock away carbon below ground – and best of all, to reap these benefits all you have to do is not mow your lawn in May!

There are over 20 million gardens in the UK so even the smallest grassy patch adds up to a significant proportion of land which, if managed properly, can deliver enormous gains for nature, communities and the climate.

The Gardens are obliged to maintain the manner and style of the Gardens from over 350 years ago - which was certainly less concerned with conserving the 'natural and the wild than we are. But we nevertheless embrace #NoMowMay in our wilder areas, but have to cut the main lawn to keep the grass healthy and accessible for you visitors. Even so we continue to do as much as we can to naturally attract bees and insects to the Gardens... for the benefit of us all on this planet.


