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
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An update from the Parish Church of Water Orton

In November our church, along with many other churches, people from other religions and no religion will observe remembrance Sunday. This year it takes place on the 10th November, the Sunday closest to the 11th November.

The Armistice, an agreement to end the fighting of the First World War as a prelude to peace negotiations, began at 11am on the 11th November 1918. To this day we mark Armistice Day around the United Kingdom with a two-minute silence at 11am. In this silence we remember those who gave their lives in the First World war, Second World war and other conflicts since.

In 2018 Villagers raised funds for a memorial in Water Orton. On the memorial are the names of those who served in the military, who fell in both wars. I hope it will never be needed but there is space for any new names.



On Sunday the 10th November there will be a parade from the Digby Carpark (between the Parish Church and Digby pub) leaving at about 10:40am. We will gather at the memorial on Watton Lane; our service beginning just before 11am allowing for two minutes silence on the hour. There will be representatives there from the Boys Brigade, the Scouts, Cubs, Methodist Church and those in our community and surrounding communities.

During our short service there will be an opportunity to lay wreaths. Any organisation or member of the public are welcome to do so. If you would like to do so please arrive by 10:45am at the latest and make yourself known to me.

Two soldiers have been laid to rest in the cemetery by the church. On the

headstone of one is the bible verse, 'Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.' These men gave up their lives so that we might live.

This quote is taken from The Messiah, Jesus Christ, who gave his life for all of us. Some more of his recorded words are: 'For God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not die but have eternal life.'

On Sunday 10th November I will remember the sacrifice of Joseph Boneham, Charles Burton, Arnold Hawkins, Sidney Prosser and Gilbert Willdey who gave their lives in the first world war, those who gave their lives in the second world war: John Comley, Harold Crowley, William H. Fisher, Michael Kavanagh, Lewis Leak, Henry Merricks, Bernard Rhodes, Thomas Rhodes, Richard M. Smith and Harold L. Wright and Jesus who gave his life. Please join us on the 10th November. God Bless

Anti-Slavery Day 2024 – do you know how to spot the signs of modern day slavery?



Many people think slavery is something unheard of in this day and age, or it's not happening near or around them.

In actual fact slavery is happening, and it is happening in Warwickshire.

Police and Crime Commissioner, Philip Seccombe, commissions the West Midlands Anti Slavery Network to provide a service that supports victims of modern-day slavery. Nigel Oseman, is our Independent Modern Slavery Advocate working with partners including the police and local authorities, helping raise community awareness and also training front line staff and practitioners, he is always looking for opportunities to help people understand the issues surrounding this abhorrent crime. We want to give you some help on how to spot some of the signs of slavery and where to report.

First it's important to know there are different types:

- General
- Labour exploitation, when a person is forced to work or provide a service against their will
- Criminal exploitation, when a person is made to commit crimes against their will
- Sexual exploitation, when a person is deceived, coerced or forced to engage in sexual activity

- Domestic servitude, when the domestic worker's mobility is restricted, and they are compelled to work extended hours for inadequate compensation
- Forced marriage
- Organ harvesting

There are some **key signs** that may help you spot if someone is a victim of modern day slavery:

- Show signs of being controlled and dependent
- Show signs of trauma including psychological and physical
- Act fearful, anxious, depressed, submissive, tense, or nervous/paranoid
- Have no passport or someone else is holding their passport/ID documents
- Act fearful of police/authorities
- Have little or no contact with family or loved ones

How can you help someone who you believe to be a victim?

There is a whole host of information on the West Midlands Anti Slavery Network website, with more detail on all of the above, and support for victims and survivors.

If you or someone you know is a victim of any form of exploitation, or you suspect someone may be at risk of exploitation, you can contact your local District or Borough Council, or Warwickshire Police on 101. In an emergency call 999.

Alternatively, you can contact the independent Modern Slavery Helpline to report any suspicions or concerns about individuals, premises or locations. Businesses can also call for advice. Call 0800 0121 700 or report www.modernslaveryhelpline.org.

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

Commissioner invites community projects and initiatives to bid for grant funding



The Commissioner has launched his annual Grants Scheme for 2025/26. Warwickshire organisations with projects and initiatives that help to prevent or deter crime, anti-social behaviour or contribute to road safety, are being invited to bid for funding.

The Scheme seeks to support projects and initiatives which support his overall aims of reducing crime, supporting victims and making communities safer.

For the 2025/26 grants awards, organisations across the county are being invited to apply for funding of up to £15,000. There are four categories that organisations can apply to:

- Crime prevention
- Reducing reoffending
- Children and young people
- Road safety

Last year the Commissioner received 57 applications, and awarded a total of over $\pounds 270,000$ to 32 organisations.

Opening the application process, Mr Seccombe said:

"My grants fund is a vital way of supporting initiatives which help to support my ambition to reduce crime, support victims and make communities safer.

I hope to see applications from a wide range of community groups, charities and other organisations with innovative projects that can make a real difference to communities and victims of crime, as well as those that prevent offences from happening in the first place.

I know how important it is to proactively engage with our youth, providing them with new skills and a safe space away from negative influences and criminal activity. With this in mind, I am keen to see applications from projects that work with children and young people.

I also want to see applications being put forward that can make a real difference in making our roads safer, helping to reduce death and serious injuries.

I'm urging anyone who thinks they have a suitable project that can benefit from funding up to £15,000 to go online and apply before the November 29 deadline."

Projects funded by the PCC's office under the grants scheme must be delivered within the 2025/26 financial year. Organisations will be able to submit an unlimited number of grant applications. However, the maximum total award is £30,000. There will be a cap on individual project applications of £15,000.

The closing date for applications is midnight on November 29, 2024. Successful candidates will be announced by the end of January 2025.



North Warwickshire Borough Council agrees to help residents losing Winter Fuel Payment

North Warwickshire Borough Council has committed to helping elderly residents in the Borough who will miss out on Winter Fuel payments following the Government's decision to reduce the number of people who are now eligible.

Councillor David Wright proposed a motion at the Council meeting on the 17th of October setting out the Council's opposition to the Government's decision and proposing a measure of compensation for those who just miss out on the new criteria due to not being in receipt of the qualifying benefits. The Council will therefore make a one-off payment of £100 to those over 66 who no longer receive the Winter Fuel Payment and are in receipt of Council Tax support. No application process will be needed as the Council can make the payments direct to those residents.

Speaking after the Council meeting, Councillor Wright said:

Councillor Wright said:
"I am appalled at the decision that the

Government has made on Winter Fuel payments which will leave very many people concerned about heating costs this winter. Our particular concern is that group of residents who always seem to just miss out on help due to not being in receipt of particular types of benefits. We do not have the resources to fully rectify this very harmful decision by the Government but by targeting £55,000 we can reinstate around half of the average Winter Fuel payment to that particular group."

Councillor Wright's proposal also saw a further £35,000 added to the Council's Hardship Fund to help residents facing financial pressures and is in addition to the significantly increased staff resources the Council must help people facing financial challenges. North Warwickshire Borough Council's Financial Inclusion team works hard with residents to maximise incomes, find ways back into work and offers practical help with everyday cost of living pressures. The team are currently working with those residents who may be eligible for Pension Credit but are not currently claiming this.

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Castle Bromwich Hall Gardens

News from Castle Bromwich Historic Gardens

"Oh that old Chestnut..."

Unlike the idiom, we rather like all the 'repeated' chestnut trees around the Gardens, Hall and Parkland. There still remains the vestiges of at least two avenues of horse chestnut trees: the West and the South Avenue[1], as well as a number of single, probably self-seeded, horse chestnuts across the whole area, including surrounding the

There comes a time, however, when we must say a very sad goodbye to these old giants. This week our trusted tree surgeon contractor, Chris, spent three days suspended high in the air on a crane platform slowly, bit by bit chopping the Melon Ground Chestnut tree down to a height just above the level of the walls.

Those of you who have sat and captured the sunshine in the Melon Ground or relaxed on a summer's evening listening to live music during the Melon Ground Sessions, will have benefitted and marvelled at the magnificent horse chestnut leaning in over the walls.

By its girth, we think the tree is about 100 years old. We don't know, but we think it is unlikely that it was planted there deliberately. As many visitors over the years will

have seen, as it grew bigger and bigger it leant and pressed
What about the wood? into the walls of the Melon Ground. Two circular braces were attached to the walls in an attempt to secure them and the tree kept growing and creating cracks in the wall.

The relationship, or perhaps the 'competition', between the tree and the wall epitomises the dilemma that our Trust constantly faces. We are obliged by our constitution to look after and conserve the historic fabric of this special garden design. At the same time we have to balance the long term needs of heritage with the environmental imperatives of nature and the planet.

Thankfully the Gardens are in a very large Conservation Area, so we are always able to consult with the relevant authorities about managing the trees as well as the historic walls.

About four years ago it was evident the tree was not well. Chris trimmed the tree to prevent any of the really large branches falling. The tree seemed to revive a bit... but this year on closer inspection It was found to be diseased pretty badly.

The lower trunk of the tree has now been left, for nature to take its course and for any bats, insects and birds that can benefit. We will be keeping an eye on the wall, to spot any movement.

As always, we try to find use for 'recycled' wood. Some of the very heavy logs will be used in our Forest School, story circle area, some by local woodturners (and will be sold in the shop), the sawdust will be used in our compost toilet and other chippings as part of our mulching and composting.

Long term care of the trees

This year has seen an increase in costly major tree care work the Trust has had to undertake. A large pine on the Old Birmingham Road border, weakened by at least two vandal burnings has had to be cut down, a mature walnut, fallen during one of the storms also needed making safe... amongst many other smaller projects.

A mixture of climate change, unpredictable seasonal variations and the age of our many trees all suggest that the Trust's budget setting for at least the next decade will have to include a much bigger figure for professional tree care...we reckon it will add another 3% to our 'standstill' costs of £1,000 per day.

As always, the Gardens and Parkland depend on member and visitor income as well as project grants to fund these costs. Thank you for you continued support.

The Story of Castle Bromwich Parish Church (pt15)

Whilst in earlier years, change to the fabric of the Parish Church was entirely in the hands of the Lord of the Manor, we are now in the times of "congregational democracy."

Suggested changes are debated by the Parochial Church Council – made up of representatives of the worshippers – and then voted on – theoretically!

In truth it really depends on the "dynamism" of the Rector of the Parish of the time, in the more recent years we have had two particularly significant Rectors.

Three years after coming to Castle Bromwich - in 1986, the Rev'd Christopher Boyle initiated a major project to stabilize the effects of the encasement of 1726-31. To permit the installation of a flat ceiling at that time, the wind braces were removed from the truss structures.

The unrestrained weight of the clay tiling had, over the intervening 250 years, caused the rafter feet to spread. This needed to be arrested by fixing steel tie-rods across the church. This was a large structural exercise and needed an appeal to raise funds which were matched by grants from various bodies.

In 1997 Christopher Boyle asked one of the then Church Wardens, Les Jones, and myself to investigate possible replacement of the thirty year old Foden Room with a larger meeting room with modern amenities abd more suitable for wider community usage.

The church is part of the village Conservation Area with the old Hall and the Garden Trust established in 1985 for public benefit as a separate Charitable Body. Because of this grouping, our first move was to examine the possibility of cooperation to produce a building which could serve all three bodies. Sadly we concluded that the needs were so diverse – and times of primary demand clashed so badly – that there would be no way this could be done.

We therefore consulted all the interests within the congregation to find their primary requirements and produced an outline scheme which we introduced to the Diocesan authorities.

At this stage virtually every Historical interest body registered an objection! I won't detail the tortuous negotiations that followed, but I drew up schemes with the building in every conceivable location in the churchyard – even one which would have given the church a crypt!

This process took so long that Christopher Boyle moved on to become Bishop of Northern Malawi. His replacement was basically overwhelmed by the effort involved and the project stalled.

Fortunately, in 2008 he was followed by a most dynamic priest, the Rev'd Gavin Douglas who had



been a Lieutenant Colonel in the Argyle & Southerland Highlanders. With assistance from David Greaves, who had considerable financial expertise, and a local architectural practice, a Community Hall was finally built. This amenity has totally enlivened the parish.

This building is available for hire by organisations whether affiliated to the church or not and is heavily booked.

Its existence has brought about the "rediscovery" of the southern part of the churchyard – previously an area of "no-man's land."

A significant aspect of the scheme not resolved, was the linkage between the church and hall – important on wet and windy days on our exposed hilltop location.

The Community Hall up and running well and Rev'd Gavin retired, we formed a new committee to address this problem and improve the visitor experience generally.

This of course was "scuppered" by the Pandemic but we are now "back on the case" and this month's illustration shows what we are seeking to produce.

Somebody's Hero

Mum passed away last month. Until that day, I did not know what grief was. I never fully understood it; the heartache, sorrow and sadness, and the sinking feeling in the pit of the stomach that won't go away. Losing her, even though I know that she lived a full life, broke me. She left a gaping hole in our lives that can never be filled by anyone else. It was almost like she was here one minute and gone the next. She finally lost her battle to the dreaded cancer that took her away from us. From the day we were told that it had come back - raging to the day she went to sleep was just a matter of days. The woman who always said, 'nothing can happen to me, I am made of iron' had no choice but to surrender her life to that horrible disease.

Mum - my shining star, my rock, and my hero. She came to live in England as a young woman of about 25 years of age with two children in tow, me and my sister. Subservient and not allowed to have a voice, she toiled and laboured in a strange country that showed her no mercy. It could have; this strange country could have been the freedom she longed for. Alas, it wasn't meant to be. She didn't choose the life she led. It was through no fault of the country she came to live in, and neither was it through any fault of her own. She was, and remained, a victim of circumstances.

Mum - the epitome of acceptance and obedience; she gave her all to those she loved and cared about. In this she didn't hold back. However, the boundaries and shackles of the culture within which she lived her daily life limited, and indeed controlled, her free will, and her innermost wishes and desires. Culture and tradition - what is it all about anyway? We are all guilty in some way or another. We follow it when it suits us but disregard the bits we don't like. If we look hard enough, we would discover that we are all hypocrites. For mum this so-called adherence to culture and tradition was everything that could make her life as unbearable as possible. I am not saying she was always unhappy. She wasn't but she lived her life for others, not for herself.

Working where she wanted was out of the question. So, she worked in a clothes making factory run by Asians. As if Asians could be trusted and had any more credibility than anyone else! Had dad forgotten where he had come from? The country that was and still is rife with corruption, crime and rape. Perhaps dad did realise after all because it wasn't long before an industrial sewing machine

found its way into our home. Mum sat at the helm. There she sat as her youngest child – another girl – lay on the sofa with a milk bottle stuck in her mouth. Mum drove the fabric through the machine day in and day out to produce wonderful creations for next to nothing. A man would come to the door and drop off bundles of fabric and then come to pick up the clothes she had created in return for a small brown envelope which somehow always found its way to our gran.

A husband who was stuck in his ways and refused to budge and adapt to change and a mother-in-law who was the mother of all mothers-in-law saw mum serving everyone's needs but her own. I mean, what needs did she have anyway? What needs could an Indian wife have; this was the view of all men and their mothers. Mum wasn't allowed to express her needs and desires. She had only one job; to bring up her children and look after the rest of the family.

Mum lived by the philosophy that all

Asian girls had instilled in them before

they entered their marital home. It is better to stay silent than open your mouth and speak words best left unsaid; or as she imparted to us, 'Ek chup, sau sukh'. She never strayed from this belief and perhaps that is why she survived a one-sided relationship for all these years. She was tolerance. She was a tower of strength, and she was my absolute rock. Mum was eighty-six years young this year. She could not speak a word of English. This angers me. This angers all her children and it is sad. It is not possible to fully understand why she never spoke the language of the country in which she lived for sixty years except that perhaps no-one ever gave her the opportunity to learn. Dad could have but he didn't. Control and the fear of losing that control makes us do things we might regret later on in life. Don't rock the boat as they say. Though he never says it, I am

Mum carried on – silent, unquestioning and as dutiful as day one. Until the day she physically and mentally couldn't, she cooked and cleaned and waited on her husband. However, mum could often be heard muttering something under her breath as if she would like to say it out loud but thought better of it. When we would ask her why she never said anything to dad, she would always reply, "There's only the tail end left now".

sure Dad is full of regrets but if he is, he

will never admit it. He is as stubborn as

the day he was born.

My dearest mum, we miss you so much. We miss your hugs and embraces, your never-ending smile, your running around after everyone, your home-cooked food, and your strength and perseverance. Wherever you are, somewhere over the rainbow, may you be free and happy. Forever in our hearts and in our minds.

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




Interiors Decorating



Platinum November Update



This month we're just going to stick with a few general tips across several different areas of decorating, hopefully you'll find some of the advice helpful.

New plaster: If you have newly plastered walls to paint they need to be sealed first. New plaster is very porous, a mist coat seals it to negate the porosity. If you don't seal the plaster then when you paint it the water will be sucked out of the emulsion leaving the vinyl sitting on top of the plaster. It might seem ok but at some point it will start peeling off, sometimes not until you come to redecorate and roll new paint onto it. As decorators this is a common problem that we come across. One thing you definitely shouldn't use is PVA or watered down PVA. We're not sure where this has come from but it seems that a lot of people are advised to use PVA prior to painting. This is bad advice, it can lead to problems with the paint not adhering properly. The correct method is to apply what's known as a 'mist coat'. This is a watered down coat of emulsion. You can use the paint that you'll be using as the finish coat but most decorators will use contract matt- that's emulsion with no vinyl in it. Check the back of the tin of whatever paint you're using, this will tell you how much water to add for fresh plaster.

Check data sheets and paper labels: Always check the data sheets for paint (either on line or on the back of the tin) prior to purchasing them. Not all paints are the same, some will recommend using a specific primer or undercoat, others will advise on restrictions to use such as temperature or humidity levels- this is particularly important for exterior work. If you follow the information provided by the data sheets you'll make your life easier and will complete a project to the best possible standard. It's also advisable to read all the information provided on the label that comes with wallpaper. Especially if it recommends a certain type of paste. If a manufacturer recommends a particular type of paste and you don't use it then they won't honour any guarantee if there's a problem with the finish of the paper.

Different types of filler: Most people will have a tub of ready mixed filler and will use it for everything. As with paint and wallpaper, you should check the information provided before doing so. There will usually be a maximum depth for the filler- if you use it for any holes deeper than recommended then you may experience problems with it taking too long to dry and possibly having it sink, meaning you'll end up having to fill it again. There will also be advice on what surface it can be used on- it's likely that a filler for walls won't be suitable for woodwork and you'll need to get something recommended for wood. Likewise if you're filling prior to exterior painting you'll need a filler that is recommended for exterior use.

Sandpaper: Sandpaper comes in a variety of finishes known as 'grits'. The lower the number, the more course it is. So if you're sanding something that it is very bad condition you'll need a lower grit such as 60G. Once you've got through the big lumps and bumps you'll need to use a finer finish paper prior to painting such as 240G for a smooth finish.

Different types of paint finish: We covered this in detail before but just briefly, make sure you chose the right finish for the job. For walls you can chose matt, but if you want more of a sheen then you can use eggshell, soft sheen or, for a higher sheen, silk. Generally the higher the sheen, the more durable the finish. Although these days there are a lot of options for durable matt finishes. The same goes for woodwork- the most common finishes are eggshell, satin and gloss. Gloss being the highest sheen and the most durable. Another tip regarding sheen levels is the higher the sheen the more it will highlight imperfections. So a very flat, matt finish will go some way to disguising

The most important advice is to make sure you carry out full and thorough prep prior to painting. This will ensure a better and longer lasting finish.

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
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Castle Bromwich Parish Council News

HS2 must do more to clamp down on the disruption being caused in Coleshill and Water Orton

It's been a busy month as your MP. I've had many conversations about our constituency's needs in the upcoming budget with the Chancellor and Treasury ministers, voted in favour of Labour's Plan to Make Work Pay, and supported local pensioners at my pensioner drop-in surgeries to access thousands of pounds worth of benefits they didn't know they were entitled to. In all cases, getting the best deal for the residents of North Warwickshire and Bedworth has been my highest priority.

I know from speaking to many of you that the impact of the construction of HS2 is really being felt in Coleshill and Water Orton. These problems are yet another example of how the last government allowed this project to spiral out of control, with tens of billions of pounds of taxpayers' money wasted and Conservative ministers washing their hands of responsibility for the private company they left in charge.

Under Labour, that laissez faire approach to public spending will change. I'm delighted the Transport Secretary has announced a review of HS2 this month, with ministerial oversight reinstated so the government can get a grip of the chaos and bring this runaway project back under control.

For my constituents, that means taking HS2 and the local contractor BBV to task over the disruption being caused to residents' lives. Coleshill and Water Orton will be particularly badly affected by the three weekends of motorway closures on the M42, so I will be making immediate representations to HS2 to see what can be done to minimise the disruption that will bring.

Last month, I called a community meeting in Water Orton, where I heard directly from more than sixty residents about the appalling impact the HS2 works are having. I've heard of care workers struggling to reach appointments on time, tradespeople having to cut back their hours, and seen footage of flooding on people's property. It was shocking to hear of the mental and physical toll this has taken on people.

Even worse, constituents have told me how efforts to raise complaints with HS2 are being fobbed off to the outsourced construction company BBV. HS2 is the ultimate controller of the project - it's unacceptable for them to try and pass the buck for the impact construction is having on residents.

Last week, I called for a debate in Parliament on the impact of HS2's construction, so that ministers can hear the stories shared by constituents, and feed those into the review they have launched.

I'm also establishing regular meetings with HS2, to end the stonewalling of complaints, ensure residents' voices are heard, and get the worst of the disruption tackled. I want to see better communication with residents, more accountability for contractors, and mitigations for disruption in place, and I have made it plain to HS2 that I won't rest until I get the results my constituents need.

I'm holding several surgeries in Coleshill and Water Orton in the coming weeks – please do come along if there is anything you think I can help you with. I am also holding a drop-in with Citizens Advice at Water Orton Community Library, 11am – 1pm on Friday 22 November. No appointment necessary.

Missing Buildings and Spaces 17

I think I have dealt with some of Lichfield Road previously but I seems sensible to deal with it again as I move down the High Street. These photos are mainly pre 1960 after which date most of Coleshill became a building site with redevelopment taking place on the High Street, and the whole area which was once Cole End Farm. On the right just after walking over the bridge there is the Wheatsheaf Inn which has been on that site for many years. There used to be a group of cottages in the current car park, the cottages were demolished in the 60's I think.





On crossing the bridge on just passing Station Road there is a large imposing building which was a coaching inn it closed just before the !st World War, I was told the name was changed from Kings Arms to Queens Arms depending on the sex of the monarch. After it closed the building was changed into flats., just beyond were 3 cottages which were below road level and thus flooded regularly after heavy rain.



On walking over the bridge, a building on the left would be clearly seen. The corn mill at Cole End. The first photo of the mill shows it at the end of the mill pond and the tunnels through which the water flowed to give power may be seen. The second photo is of the mill pond in flood, when this occurred the whole area was flooded and caused chaos. The mill was demolished in the 1930's.



About this time the route of the river was changed. Originally it ran down the side of the Lichfield Road but when the A446, which became known as Coleshill bypass was built and became a dual carriagway just before the 2nd World War the path of the River Cole was changed to it's current route.

In the final photo the sign for the A446 may be clearly seen on the left just after the cottages

New Honorary FreemenDeanna and Barry Baker

Coleshill Town Council has honoured both Deanna and Barry Baker with the title of Honorary Freeman, something last awarded to Gordon Sherratt in 2013.

Deanna Baker retired from caretaking duties at the Town Hall on 30 September, after 56 years in covering the role, having been employed by the church initially and before Coleshill Town Council was even created in the mid-70s. She has been Caretaker or Key Holder for all that time with two employers.

At the presentation evening, on 16 October, Mayor of Coleshill, Sue Wallace commented that Deanna had not just been a caretaker but was quite a significant and active member of the Women's Institute and the Country Markets groups and had provided catering services to many of the town's events.

Her husband, Barry Baker was awarded the honour for his time in the town, having moved from Lichfield when much younger. He had worked for the Post and Fire services and was also the key holder for Chantry House for many years, when its car park has been kindly made available for the bigger events in the town. Although Deanna has been the employed caretaker, Barry has helped her with openings and locking up of the Town Hall at all hours of the day and night.

The award of Honorary Freeman is one of the most prestigious awards which a council can bestow upon a valued member of the community, or upon a visiting celebrity or dignitary. It arises from the medieval practice of granting respected citizens their freedom from serfdom. Although the title of 'freeman' confers no special privileges, it is without a doubt an honour to receive such an award and is a great and lasting tribute to a person held in high regard. In Coleshill, Honorary Freeman are added to the Civic List and invited to all major civic occasions in the calendar, like the Civic Service, Remembrance Day and the Christmas events.

The Mayor of Coleshill is seen (pictures attached) presenting the certificates and Honorary Freeman ribbons and broaches to both Barry and Deanna. Other Councillors were present, as were Town Hall staff and friends and family of the couple, covering 3









generations. Daughter-in-law Jeanette Baker prepared the buffet and grandson Jake played the Town Hall piano in the background while many people milled around the Fifield Room to reminisce with the new Honorary Freeman.

After the Mayor had given a speech about Barry and then Deanna and their history in the town, Deanna responded with a speech of her own, thanking the various people from the church and council who had made their time in the neighbouring house to the Town Hall so enjoyable, for so many years.

Hartshill Health Centre and Community Hub in Nuneaton was excited to host a grand opening ceremony on Thursday 24 October in celebration of its one-year anniversary. The event marked a significant milestone for the Hartshill Health Centre as it continues to grow and meet the evolving healthcare needs of the community.

On the day the Lord Lieutenant of Warwickshire, Tim Cox, was in attendance to officially open the Centre with the ceremonial cutting of a ribbon, followed by a special unveiling of a wall plaque.

The opening ceremony was followed by speeches about the importance of the centre and looking after the health of our local communities by the Lord Lieutenant; then Dr Bal Sidhu, Senior Partner at Hartshill Health Centre; Cllr Margaret Bell from Warwickshire County Council, and Professor Danielle Oum, Chair of the Integrated Care Board. It currently provides essential GP, nursing, and midwifery care, and serves as a specialised outpatient clinic hub for Cardiology services (including the provision of echocardiograms and Atrial Fibrillation clinics), Dermatology, and Orthopaedics, extending its reach to a wider patient base across Warwickshire.

The health centre also acts as a base for the South Warwickshire University NHS Foundation Trust (SWFT) which provides specialist nursing services in the community, and the Rural Warwickshire Primary Care Network: comprising five GP surgeries which together coordinate care for up to 55000 patients in the region and are responsible for introducing the pioneering Frailty Clinic.

The centre is committed to expanding its services, with new additions on the horizon to better serve residents and the wider community. In the coming months, a Pain Clinic, Pharmacy, and Dental Services (to include minor oral surgery) will be integrated into the facility, further enhancing access to comprehensive healthcare under one roof.

Plans are underway to expand secondary care services at Hartshill Health Centre's primary care setting. With its proximity to three schools and the availability of clinicians experienced in Accident and Emergency, the health centre is ideally suited for a walk-in urgent care centre. There is also ample space to incorporate onsite X-ray facilities. By localising these services, we can significantly reduce travel and wait times, leading to better health outcomes. This initiative will ensure timely interventions, enhance patient satisfaction, and alleviate the burden on both patients and the healthcare system.

Dr Bal Sidhu, Senior Partner at Hartshill Health Centre, said:

"We are incredibly proud of the progress Hartshill Health Centre has made over the past year. The addition of more specialised services like the Pain Clinic, Pharmacy, and Dental Services will allow us to deliver an even higher standard of care and support to our community."

Cllr Margaret Bell, Warwickshire County Council Portfolio Holder for Adult Social Care and Health, said:

"Hartshill Health Centre makes a real difference in people's lives by providing highquality and accessible healthcare services closer to home. 


fans of Sue Watson, Valerie Keogh and K.L. Slater.

November update

Welcome to our November update, we kick off with Guy Fawkes night, in the days of my youth this was a special night when the night sky was quite innocent of fireworks until after dark on the 5th itself, maybe nostalgia isn't what it used to be!

Wildlife ways

I have chased up last of the wildlife ways verge cutting in the Chestnut Drive and Hall road area, across Solihull this has taken longer to complete this year. This has not been helped by some of the unprecedented rain we have received. SMBC officers have responded that when wet the cuttings (Arisings) are left to dry before being collected. I have checked that these have been removed from Water Orton Road, sadly Autumn leaf litter has swiftly replaced this.

Autumn leaves

In addition to normal street cleansing operations Leaf collection is scheduled at 10 Locations in Castle Bromwich, we will be making a special focus on gully ways or linking footpaths such as the path from new street to Wentworth Avenue clearing leaves etc, I will inspect these going forward.

Flash Flooding

Due to unprecedented rain during October Flooding has occurred in low lying areas, the effect of this on nearby homes has been exacerbated by careless drivers driving too fast through standing water, we are following up some drainage system maintenance questions with SMBC and Severn Trent.

Water Orton Road and Green Lane Road safety works

I have inspected these during October with residents.

Several drain gullies are filled with sand, silt and organic matter from the road works, one new gully near Arden hall does not appear to be connected to the system, these have been reported for urgent attention.

The post and trip rail fence on the service road between the farthings and Park Hall school needs repair in several places.

It was good to see that the service road plastic bollard by the top end of Tomlinson Road has now been replaced, this issue was raised directly on the SMBC online 'Report it' system and quickly actioned.

The Hedging between Green lane and Marlborough Road needs attention, I will check that this is scheduled.

The next monthly surgery is scheduled for Monday the 4th of November and takes place at the Library at 14:00, no appointment is required, please email, or call me if anything urgent comes up in the meantime.


World record broken & fitness endurance challenges set to reach 899


