

The Coleshill School Will Remember!

On Monday 11th November 2024, The Coleshill School held its annual Remembrance Service to commemorate former students of The Coleshill School who lost their lives in active service.

In front of a packed Hall of students and visitors, Sixth Form students proudly read out the names of 27 'old boys' from the first world war, 9 from the second world war and James Munday who was killed in Afghanistan in 2008. The last post was played followed by a two minute silence. Mr Smith-Childs, ATLP Strategic Lead commented "I would like to thank all our students, staff and visitors including, Cllr Sue Wallace, Mayor of Coleshill, and Andrew Watkins, former teacher, for attending our Remembrance ceremony.

This is an important event for the school and I am so proud of the number of students who voluntarily attended the Remembrance Service and were so respectful today to commemorate our lost boys".

For Coleshill's Remembrance Sunday
Parade and Service on Sunday The
Coleshill School were asked to submit
some artwork which was displayed in the
Town Hall. Year 7 students were asked to
produce poppies using their textile skills
which were attached to a dress on display
at the Town Hall. Mrs Pudge, Design
Technology Technician commented
"Our students have taken to this
challenge with enthusiasm and respect for
this important project, learning new skills
and creating some beautiful artwork."



Remembrance Parade and Service 2024



The honour of organising the Remembrance Sunday parade and service is a joint effort between the Royal British Legion, Parish Church, Coleshill Town Band and Coleshill Town Council.

After last year's 'unofficial' return into church, due to inclement weather, the first 'official' indoor church service since 2019 was very well received, with the welcome addition of digital orders of service, extra seating and beautifully crafted poppies around the churchyard kindly organised by the WI.

The parade was led by The Sergeant at Arms, Simon Toon, Coleshill Town Band, the Royal British Legion, Mayor of Coleshill, Cllr. Sue Wallace and Deputy Lieutenant Mr Michael Fetherston-Dilke who were joined by representatives from Coleshill Town Council, Warwickshire County Council and North Warwickshire Borough Council; followed by uniformed organisations, groups, schools, and societies from in and around Coleshill.

As always, the team behind the remembrance service and parade work diligently to honour the fallen in all conflicts. It could not happen without the participation of volunteers and Coleshill as a Community and for that, we would like to thank the following:

The Church bells rang out magnificently courtesy of the bellringers, drawing the parade forward to be graciously welcomed into the Church by the volunteers, past beautiful displays of international remembrance flowers, drumhead altar and Coleshill's silent soldier courtesy of the church Flower Guild.

Special thanks to the exceptionally talented Coleshill Town Band who always play gloriously and take immense pride in leading the parade and Rosie Harding, Principal Cornet player, for sounding the "Last Post" and "Reveille" with great dignity.

Coleshill Primary School for allowing the use of their carpark, as well as student Imogen Palmer who confidently read the Exhortation with Ray Richardson, Chair of the RBL.

This year's poppy artwork and displays were donated to the Remembrance organisers for display, this included: Twin Rivers W.I display of knitted poppies around the church and post-box toppers, the Remember When knitting group from the Town Hall kindly donating a panel of crochet/knitted/cross stitched art which was proudly displayed at Coleshill Town Hall, and the Coleshill School whose Year 7's kindly created and displayed a dress of poppies at the Town Hall. Thanks also to Maureen and Barry Gascoigne for once again decorating the Lych-gate with poppies and all the shops who proudly dressed their windows up or displayed poppies.

And finally, appreciation is given to those who lined the streets of Coleshill, filled the Church and Church Hill and attended the refreshments at the Town Hall; your encouragement, acknowledgement and support helps to make Remembrance Sunday the magnificent event that it is. One of the greatest pleasures in being involved in Coleshill's Remembrance Parade and Service is understanding how much the event means to the families of the fallen that are listed on the various War Memorials in and around Coleshill. Society Seeks Funds for Legal Fights in Defence of Open Spaces and Paths

The Open Spaces Society, Britain's oldest national conservation body, has launched a financial appeal to boost its legal-action fund. This fund pays for action in the courts to protect commons, town and village greens, open spaces, and public paths, and supports the society's members needing legal help.

The society is pleased that in the last year it has, alone and with allies, taken legal action which has won significant victories.

It has intervened to support the Dartmoor National Park Authority in confirming that there is a right to backpack camping on Dartmoor's commons-the case has been heard in the supreme court and the outcome is awaited.

With other organisations it has successfully challenged local authorities and the Planning Inspectorate on rightsof-way in Cornwall, the East Riding of Yorkshire, and North Yorkshire.

It has also backed its members' cases, in Bristol and Swansea for instance, and

stands ready to test further aspects of the law in the coming year.

Says Kate Ashbrook, general secretary of the Open Spaces Society: 'We launched our fund a year ago and, despite a magnificent response, we have spent or pledged all the money on worthwhile legal cases. Now we need to replenish it.

'The society has a proud record of going to law, over the past 159 years, to defend our rights to commons, open spaces and

'In these times of financial austerity, those who are supposed to protect our commons, open spaces, and paths are failing to do so. This demands that we step in and use the courts to safeguard these vital places.

'We frequently receive requests for legal action, and we must react quickly. Even when we lose, we often gain useful opinions and valuable insights into how to succeed another time.

'So we are seeking donations to restore our fund and enable us to continue our legal work in defence of these precious, threatened spaces and paths.'

Sue Wallace marks mayoral record with reception at historic Blyth Hall



Councillor Sue Wallace launched her record fifth term as Coleshill Town Mayor with a highly successful Cheese and Wine Reception at historic Blyth Hall near Coleshill. The Grade I-listed Hall, which was recently opened for the first time for events including community events, wedding receptions, house parties and conferences after four centuries as the private home of the Dugdale family proved a major attraction. VIPs, history enthusiasts and fellow-mayors explored the newlyrefurbished mansion and enjoyed a lively presentation on Blyth and the Dugdales from renowned historian Dr Andrew Watkins. Cllr Wallace was delighted to welcome 140 people to the Reception which raised over £2000 for the Mayor's charity Father Hudson's Caritas which supports disadvantaged people across the Midlands.

Dr Watkins, an expert on the Medieval period in North Warwickshire, described the influence of the great historian Sir William Dugdale, who wrote the iconic 'Antiquities of Warwickshire' and became a central part of King Charles I's court. On the day Dugdale was born, September 12th, 1605 at the Old Rectory in Shustoke a swarm of bees gathered in the orchard, apparently foretelling the new baby's industry and future success. His father John, a steward of Maxstoke Priory tutored several members of the local gentry, and ensured that the young William was highly-educated. The boy encouraged by like-minded scholars developed a fascination with architecture and archaeology, his close observation and accurate illustrations of the buildings and antiquities he described, later laying the foundations for modern history writing.

Having bought Blyth Hall, then a glorified farmhouse, in 1625 for £1125, Sir William and later his son John each updated and extended the house, adding a wing and making it more comfortable and spacious.

Dr Watkins also explained how the both men introduced controversial changes in farming

to boost their growing estates' profits, allegedly driving off many local people and grubbing up hedges. They replaced labourintensive crop farming with sheep and cattle-rearing, employing just a few herdsmen, grazing their animals on the lush, marshy meadowland beyond the existing fishponds beside the house, known as the Stews. Many locals hated these innovations and Dr Watkins recounted how in 1629 Dugdale had some common land enclosed, and planted hedges around his estate, to the fury of his neighbour Fisher Dilke. While Dugdale was away for Christmas, the hedges were pulled up and thrown into the river.

"I'm thrilled that so many people came to Blyth for my mayoral reception," said Cllr Wallace and I'd like to thank all those who so generouly suppored me. "There's so much interest in this glorious house, and Andrew really brought its history alive with his atmospheric talk.

My next major event will be a 4-couse charity dinner and drinks reception for Parkinson's UK on January 25th at Coleshill Town Hall, with the playwright David Tristram as our speaker. David's well-known for his comedies and we've performed several with Coleshill Drama Group, so this should be a really special

The restaurant is a Family run Business and has been open on this site for over 15 years offering fine Bangladeshi & Indian Cuisine.

You can feel the drive and passion from Lutfer (the Owner) who thrives in offering fresh quality food every time.

We booked a table ahead although not necessary and when we arrived, we were welcomed by the staff and was pleasantly surprised to see that the restaurant has recently undergone a complete refurbishment, transforming it into a modern, stylish place that Oozes comfort, in relaxing surroundings with views of the country side as you look out of the windows.

The restaurant has a fully licenced bar with a large selection of drinks on offer.

After studying the menu, we thought we would try three main dishes with the usual

a medium curry stated on the menu, but I would say it is medium/Hot


Butter Chicken – Delicate Chicken -Very tender chicken pieces in a lovely traditional butter sauce. Everything you would expect from a mild curry and more.

The History of Castle Bromwich Parish Church (pt16)

In the first article of this series, in Autumn 2023, I told of my "discovery" of our church after riding up Chester Road hill on my old bike. I wasn't even a teenager when I saw the amazing building for the first time – knowing nothing of its fascinating history.

Somehow I seem to have been fated to be associated with it as, by a quirk of Diocesan admin, my future wife couldn't be married in her parish church, so, years later, we were wed here in 1961.

Returning to the actual church history, when in 1762 the Bridgeman family inherited the Weston Park estate as their country seat, their influence on Castle Bromwich church matters became less immediate and the use as a Family Chapel obviously lessened and alterations minimal.

In 1815, the year the family became Earls of Bradford (of the 2nd Creation), a choir gallery was added above the font at the west end and later in the nineteenth century an organ was fitted. At the encasement all windows were clear glazed. Mid-century this was replaced with geometrically coloured glass. One window remains, at the base of the tower, in the sacristy.

In 1827 we had been separated from Aston, becoming a stand-alone parish and in 1878 the church achieved Parish Church status and acquired a Rector to oversee spiritual wellbeing.

At about the same time gas lighting was installed – the same pew-end standards are now electrified.

As mentioned in an earlier article, in 1893, Charles Edward Bateman, a local architect involved in a general restoration – possibly including insertion of the Bradford family memorial windows in the Chancel and central heating – "rediscovered" the medieval

timber structure totally encased in the centre of the church. This sparked the, still continuing, debate over the true inspiration for the encasement work.

In 1902 the two tablets of stone bearing the text of the Ten Commandments, originally filling the upper panel of the Reredos above the altar, were moved to the North and South walls of the chancel – one to each side. They were replaced by the present representation of the Ascension in alabaster.

My own connection with Castle Bromwich resumed when the freeholders of our first house bought the Hall and, after 1970 I came here to pay the ground rent each

In doing this I found that, three years earlier, the needs of modern life had caught up with the church – the first major change that had been made since 1731

The Foden Room, named after a longserving verger, was built to provide vesting and meeting room space with a toilet. It connected to the former, main, south door with a corridor providing a weather-proof link.

Although designed by a respected Birmingham architect, a member of the congregation, it was a depressing little cube of a building but reflected the scarcity of finance. How useful it was though over the years and what a legacy it left!

My next connection with our area was when I was called upon to design a housing layout on former Bradford Estate land directly opposite the church.

Permission was granted by Meriden Rural District Council, the then Planning Authority and my wife and I with our two daughters and baby son moved into the first house later in 1974.

This month's illustration shows "Eldon House" which formerly stood on the site of our house, and was there when the Beighton Prospect was drawn in 1726.



Winter in the Gardens

Apart from the odd really, really wet weather days, this Winter in the Gardens has been exceptionally beautiful. Autumn colours of leaves seems to have gone on for much longer than usual.

Thankfully, gardeners have generally kicked the habit of burning their leaf piles. In days gone by, no doubt the gardeners here at the Hall would have raked the leaves and set them on fire in the name of 'neatness'.

These days we understand a bit more about how much fallen leaves contribute to the health of the earth. They are an important part of the natural cycle, providing nutrition as well as habitat for woodland creatures. Resisting the urge to clear under hedges is really key, not only are the leaves good for the soil which feeds the hedge, but hedgehogs may be hibernating there. We are lucky in Castle Bromwich to have wonderful citizens who voluntarily help clear the more harmful human and plastic litter that get lodged under hedges.

Free compost... all it takes is patience.

Leaving a layer of leaves on our flower beds is easy, but we all feel the necessity of raking and clearing pathways of slippery leaves. Even swept up wet and blackspotted leaves can be really useful though. Why not have a go at making your own free leaf mulch and compost.

Patience is the key.



Throw the leaves into a bin bag or an old builders sack. Making sure they're damp, tie the bag up, pierce a couple of holes in the bag – to let air circulate - and wait....

At least a year! After a year the crackly leaves are great for top dressing, covering bare soil and even digging in before planting to improve drainage. If you have the patience to wait two or even three years the resulting brown crumbly mixture

can be mixed in with other compost to create your own potting compost.

Here at the Gardens, we have a bit more space and have a giant open pile of leaves in one of our compost bays. The chemical composition of leaves means they breakdown through the action of fungi, not bacteria, so they are kept separate from other compost. We try to keep twigs and branches separate too... While we cannot avoid buying some specialist potting compost from commercial sources, with such a large garden to look after it makes sense to make our own compost. But for the earth's sake, even if you have a tiny growing patch do make use of those free fallen leaves.

Now the days are shorter, the Café and Gardens close at 3.30pm. Don't forget the Café is free to enter so don't miss out on the warming tea and hot chocolate. We've cracked open the homemade soup too, after a poor pumpkin harvest this year, our volunteer made soup is pumpkin and mixed veg. And so Christmas has come around

In the Anglican calendar Advent marks the beginning of our year, when we look forward to the birth of our Lord. This year it commences on the 1st December. The earliest date is the 27th November, when Christmas day falls on a Sunday. The latest would be the 3rd December when Christmas day falls on a Monday. This is because Advent starts on the 4th Sunday before Christmas day.



Christians believe that the birth and life of Jesus is prophesied many times in the Old Testament. Take the prophet Isaiah who wrote, 'The Virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel'. Immanuel means "God with us". Other books in the Old Testament prophesy that this boy would be God, participating in the divine nature. On a similar note, others prophesy that his incarnation would bring

the presence of God to humankind.

Just before the birth of Jesus, Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. This meant people had to return to their ho≈metown. Joseph's hometown was Bethlehem, which required a 90 mile journey with a now very pregnant Mary. It is likely that this journey would have taken them about four days. Whilst in Bethlehem, Jesus was born and Mary placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room for them to stay in. This took place to fulfil the words of the prophet Micah, 'But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, are only a small village among all the people of Judah. Yet a ruler of Israel, whose origins are in the distant past, will come from you on my behalf."



It won't surprise you (speaking as a Christian) that I believe that Jesus is God

incarnate. I believe he entered our world with purpose out of a sense of love. Jesus means "God saves". Jesus entered our world to save us from death and give us life. Jesus acknowledges this in his own ministry, 'For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life.'

Why I voted in favour of assisted dying

I stood as an MP because I believe politics should be about giving people more choice and control over their lives, whether that's by putting more money in people's pockets or ensuring we all have access to vital public services like the NHS.

But I was not expecting so soon after being elected to be involved in a parliamentary vote quite as momentous as the vote to move Britain one step closer to allowing those with a terminal illness the choice of having an assisted death.

I know this is deeply sensitive and personal topic for many people, because so many of us have experienced the death of a loved one or had a friend or relative diagnosed with a terminal illness. Over the past few months, I have been deeply moved by the hundreds of constituents who have written to me to share their stories of pain and loss that have shaped their views on this issue.

Reading those stories was instrumental in my decision to vote in favour of the Bill, because it is clear to me that the status quo is unacceptable. It cannot be right that every year in Britain hundreds of people with terminal illnesses end their own lives alone, in pain, and forced to hide from their families for fear they will be prosecuted. It also cannot be right that those who can afford to go to Dignitas can do so, while those without the financial means do not have that choice.

I believe everyone who experiences the loss of control that comes with a terminal illness should be allowed control over the time, place, and manner of their death. That right to choose is a way we can give dying people and their families the peace and comfort they need.

I take the concerns people have raised about the potential for coercion extremely seriously, and I would not have voted for this Bill if I did not believe it contained the safeguards needed to protect the most vulnerable, such as the requirement to gain permission from two independent doctors and a High Court judge.

I also do not believe that investing in palliative care or the right to an assisted death are mutually exclusive. I will always campaign for quality end-of-life care, while recognising that it often cannot fully relieve the suffering of people with terminal illnesses.

Now the Bill has progressed to the next parliamentary stage, there will be several rounds of further scrutiny and the potential for amendments before it is put to MPs for a final vote that would change the law.

While the outcome of that vote is not guaranteed, I believe that last month's vote was an important step forward in changing the law so that those suffering terminal illnesses are given choice and control over their end of life. If you would like to share your own views about assisted dying with me, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

And one more thing... Thank you to everyone who came to my recent surgeries in Coleshill and Water Orton. I will be announcing further surgery dates on my website soon. I am also holding a public meeting at Coleshill Town Hall on Friday 10 January at 6pm. Please do come along to share your views on important local issues.

Rachel Taylor MP welcomes pension increase for 1043 former mineworkers in North Warwickshire and Bedworth

- 1043 mineworkers and their families in North Warwickshire and Bedworth will today begin to receive their first uplifted payments, boosting their pensions by an average of 32%.
- Labour delivered longstanding campaign ask from ex-pit workers, alongside new review to also ensure mineworkers receive a fair pension for years to come.
- Labour MP for North Warwickshire and Bedworth pays tribute to mineworkers who fought for justice over many years.

1043 former mineworkers in North Warwickshire and Bedworth will today begin to receive an uplift in their weekly pension, overturning an historic injustice and ensuring fair payouts for years to come.

The payment follows the Labour Government's reversal of an historic injustice, leading to £1.5billion being transferred to their pension scheme last month.

Former mineworkers will receive money in their pockets today, ensuring former pit workers who powered the country for decades finally get the just rewards from their work.

The uplift represents an average 32% rise to the annual pensions of 112,000 former mineworkers and their dependents across the UK – an average increase of £29 per week for each member.

Rachel Taylor MP, Labour MP for North Warwickshire and Bedworth, whose grandfather was a miner in the area, welcomed the announcement, saying:

"I am delighted that from today, 1043 former mineworkers in North Warwickshire and Bedworth will be receiving a significant uplift in their pensions.

"My granddad was a miner, and I watched how the closing of pits changed his world and the effect it had on our community. Our miners deserve their pensions and I'm proud this government has decided to end the injustice and deliver what is rightfully owed back to mining families.

"It is a national scandal that former miners in our area have had to fight for so long for the pension settlement they deserve.

"Today marks a victory for the relentless campaigning of the trustees, members, and coalfield communities, and will make an immediate difference to people in North Warwickshire and Bedworth."

Former mineworkers and their families have fought for justice for many years. In a landmark decision, the fund – worth £1.5 billion – has been handed over to the pension scheme, ensuring former pit workers who powered the country for decades are finally getting the just rewards from their work.

Secretary of State for Energy Ed Miliband said:

"This Labour Government has kept our promise to return money rightfully owed to ex-miners and their families- and today thousands of people will receive the money they deserve in their pension as a result.

"Today marks an end to a decades-long injustice that has denied thousands across the country the decent pension that they so undeniably deserve.

"We have delivered on our promise to right this wrong and I hope members and their families are able to enjoy the victory that they have waited far too long for." Chris Kitchen, General Secretary of the NUM said:

"The Labour Party recognised the injustice of the Mineworkers' Pension Scheme whilst in opposition. Now in Government they have made good on their manifesto commitment to return the Investment Reserve Fund so it can be used to increase pensions.

Platinum December Update

Hello all, as professional decorators we often come across problems that with the right knowledge, tools and materials are easily fixed. We thought this month we'd look at some of the most common problems and how best to go about overcoming them.

Flaking / Peeling Paint:

This problem often doesn't become apparent until you start rolling the new paint onto the wall or ceiling. As you roll over the wall the old coat of paint starts peeling off as it gets wet. This is caused by incorrect prep prior to the previous coat of paint being applied, most commonly the new plaster not being correctly sealed with $\,\,$ must take steps to make sure you're not a mist coat before painting. It's frustrating but fairly straight forward to fix. First you have to scrape of all the loose paint until you reach a point the it stops coming off. If you're lucky it will just be a small area, if not then it will be the whole room. Once you've found a solid edge you can apply a product called Zinsser Peel Stop- this will bind down and seal the edges to prevent it peeling further. Once that's dry use filler to 'feather out' and smooth off the edges, sand if necessary then continue to paint.

Persistent Cracks:

Persistent cracks are a problem in many houses. They are the result of movement in the property the most common causes being expansion due to the weather / temperature and poorly fitted plaster

boards. In some cases it is impossible to completely cure the problem but there are various approaches that can work. The easiest is to rake out the crack making it wider then use a flexible filler prior to painting. In some instances this can be enough. If that doesn't work the next step would be to apply scrim tape to the crack then swim over with filler. It will probably take 2 or 3 coats of filler feathered out quite wide either side of the tape to effectively conceal it. If you're confident that a loose plasterboard is the cause then you can also find the joists and screw in more screws to try to secure it, making sure the screw heads are sunk in then filling over them. If you do this you screwing into any pipe work or electrical wiring, if you're not certain then hire a professional.

Water Stains:

Anyone that's had a leak in an upstairs bathroom will be familiar with the resulting unsightly yellow water stain on the living room sealing. Unfortunately it's not as simple as just painting over it with emulsion- the water stain will bleed through the paint. The traditional way of dealing with this was to use a coat of solvent based paint such as oil based undercoat prior to painting with emulsion. This is still very effective but you can't usually paint over it until the next day due to it taking so long to dry. These days there are several products that do the

same job but dry in less than and hour and can be painted over within 2 hours. Our favourite is Zinsser B-I-N, it's got a very strong smell so you need to make sure the room is well ventilated but it is very good at blocking out all sorts of stains including water, grease and nicotine and can be painted over very quickly.

Crazing:

This is the technical term for a web of small cracks in a coat of paint- it resembles a miniature version of a dried up riverbed. It's usually caused by one of two things. Either the wall was previously papered and the old paste hasn't been sufficiently washed off or sealed prior to painting, the paste then reacts with the paint causing the crazing. Or, matt emulsion paint has been applied onto of silk emulsion without the correct prep. To rectify the first example the paint needs to be sand back so that it's smooth, use filler to help if necessary, then apply a coat of Zinsser Peel Stop over the affected area prior to re-painting. For the second example sand the paint back to smooth out off, again using filler if necessary, then apply a coat of Zinsser Gardz to seal the surface prior to re-painting.

White gloss or satin going yellow:

This is a problem specific to traditional solvent based paints- the stuff that smells very strong and takes ages to dry. In areas of low natural light it will yellow or discolour, it needs the UV in sunlight to stay white. That's why it's usually ok on

window sills but very bad behind furniture and inside cupboard doors. To avoid this happening you need to use a water based paint, sometimes called quick drying. Pure water based paint will maintain it's colour (if looked after). Some are known as hybrids, so they're sort of a mix of the two- they can still go yellow over time but it takes a lot longer than solvent based

Flashing:

This is the term used for when a coat of paint looks patchy or uneven despite having had several coats. It is most noticeable on smooth, flat ceilings with a source of light at one end such as a patio door. There are a few possible causessometimes it's the paint- on ceilings where it's a potential problem you need to use paint with no vinyl in it such as a contract matt. This isn't as durable as vinyl matt but this is less of an issue on a ceiling. It can also be down to how the paint is applied- you need to roll quite quickly, working away from the light source and always trying to maintain a 'wet edge'. That is making sure that the leading edge of the paint doesn't dry out, if it does then it will effectively be two coats where it's overlapped which can contribute to flashing or an uneven finish.

In an ideal world you won't come across any of these problems but if you do, hopefully some of these tips will be useful. Thanks for reading, have a good Christmas!

Carter's who were our electric store for many years, have gone.



Of course I cannot leave without a photo of Tuckley's Hardware, this insignificant shop, from the outside sold most things, if they did not have an item they would sell the things neede to make them. They in fact supplied many of the local farms.




home; the family who take their mother for granted all year round. Will the friends make it home before Christmas day? And if they do, can they really go back to their old lives?





Dear Fellow Villagers

This column comes to you from the Council Officers in Atherstone. I try and spend some time up here every week where I am able to get down to some focussed work on behalf of Water Orton away from the distractions of home.

On my way here today, I was listening to the Parliamentary Debate on the Assisted dying bill. What struck me was the respectful nature of the debate. It made a very welcome change from the knockabout shows that are often seen in the Commons.

And indeed, it is a welcome change from the party politicking that we are sadly now seemingly having to wade through at Council meetings in the chamber here.

Being a councillor is not only a significant responsibility, it is a massive privilege. It provides you with opportunities to make meaningful interventions in communities and impact positively (and negatively) on people's lives and on the environment in which we live.

There are some that think the colour of rosette or tie makes a massive difference. Personally, I don't think anyone has the monopoly on good ideas. And if the outcome of any decision is positive I don't care who suggested it. After all, we are there to represent our wards, not serve the interests of a political party or our own ambitions.

To this end I am pleased to note that I have been successful in bringing more funds into Water Orton. My focus is to see that the services provided can be accessed by everyone or that they serve the needs of residents that presently are without adequate provision.

So whilst the Spud Club (I've managed to secure funding that will enable this to continue through the winter) is largely used by older residents at lunchtime, there is access to those at school or returning from work in the evenings. Take out is quite popular on the way home from work. So please feel free to drop in at the Methodist Church between 12.30 & 6 every Monday. It's Spuddy Marvellous!!

In November alone I've been able to fund the new Parish Council Newsletter, underwrite the Chippy Tea Quiz and enable community event planning.

Further recent funding successes mean 2025 should also see the start of installation of items of exercise equipment that should enhance facilities for all but specifically the youth of the village.

The needs of the present and future villagers are not always met by the resources of the

past. The aim of creating a rejuvenated, energised community enjoying a pleasant, safe environment that respects its past whilst being hopeful for the future is one that I will continue working towards in 2025. And the support that you in this is truly appreciated.


