

## Lent reflection

It seems that even before the new year fireworks go up, retail shelves are beginning to be loaded with easter eggs. But in the christian calendar there are a couple of things that would be missed if we focussed so quickly on easter. So although it's really important, perhaps even the most important festival for Christian's we will write about that next time.



As I write this we are in the season of

epiphany which marks the time when the magi (wise men) arrived to pay respects to the young child Jesus and we are heading towards the season of Lent.

Lent is traditionally a time of Christian fasting and learning, it remembers the period of time which Jesus was tested in the wilderness. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. This year that is 5th March and some Christian's still mark the day with a special service in their church and can have crosses of ash marked on their foreheads. Water Orton will be offering an asking service at our 10am communion that day and a shorter service of ashing at 7pm Ash Wednesday is the day after Shrove Tuesday also called pancake day. Shrove Tuesday was an opportunity to use up excess food before the fasting of lent. Some of you may well be familiar with "giving up" something for lent such as a favourite treat like chocolate, wine or biscuits. This helps us consider what it was like for Jesus without food for forty days. Imagine the strength of will he must have had to go without for that long and even then at the end to say no to food offered to tempt him into sin.

Lent can also be a time for taking up something, friends have sometimes taken up extra times of prayer or they have promised to do something nice for another person every day.

I have also used Lent to take up extra study with friends on a Lent course.

The original meaning of Lent is rooted in a sense of lengthening or being drawn out. The idea of drawing nearer to Jesus in study or discipline



If you would like to take part in a Lent study group there is one running in Water Orton for people from the Coleshill, Water Orton and Castle Bromwich area. This year

it is focussing on Journeys and suffering. The course was put together by the charity "Embrace" who work predominantly in the middle east. Its at the White City Community Centre for five weeks starting 14th March at 10.30am one week after the World day of prayer service in Water Orton Parish Church. However you choose to mark Lent I pray that it will lengthen your reach to God and allow you to draw near to Jesus before Holy Week when we celebrate Jesus as King, sacrifice and redeemer.


## **Plotting for Success**

One of the most valuable items in my allotment toolbox is my allotment planner. To me, it has become as important, if not more so, than a trowel or shovel when it comes to planning and working on my growing space. It keeps me on track throughout the growing season and reminds me of what is due to sown or planted and when.

Over the last few years, I have tried several different techniques for tracking my growing diary, including a regular notebook, and buying planners from professional gardeners. But for me, my favourite and most successful method has been a 6.9 x 6.5-inch sketchbook. I am a doodler. I doodle my plans; I like to look back at something visually pleasing that isn't just bullet points or lines of handwritten or typed out notes.







This is something which is enjoyable, for me, to look back on throughout the season and especially at the end of the growing year. My 2024 planner is probably one of my favourites! I extended it to included plot to plate ideas, what I'd sown during peak growing months, and my successes and challenges during the year.



My 2025 planner is currently a work in progress but it does have a slight change in that I am including some digital images – such as "games" like a scavenger hunt and a bingo card (which includes some nonallotment goals). I have copies of them on my phone so I can refer to them "on the go", but also wanted to have them in my physical planner as a reminder when I look back on the year in December. These are fun things which you can use to engage younger gardeners throughout the season – you can make your own or I can share blank ones for you to create together as a family! For me, I'm an eternal big kid

and so I like to have fun games to keep myself engaged and enjoying my allotment journey even during those dry spells where it can seem a little bit boring. You know those periods – when we're waiting for those seeds to shoot out of the soil and it's taking too long!

The idea of my planner is going to be vital to keeping me on track this year, as it's potentially going to be my busiest and most exciting year yet. I am planning some 'tweaks' to the design of my plot as well as challenging myself to make the most of my growing space to become self-sufficient with the supply of seasonal vegetables all year round. And that doesn't include the challenges I have set for myself outside of the plot this year!

So when you are writing out your 2025 shopping list, perhaps you could consider adding a sketchbook and some pencils to it? You never know, it might also become one of the most important tools in your growing kit too.

The Gardens have been open to Members during January and we go back to normal opening days on February 15th. Wednesdays to Sundays from 10.30 – 3.30pm.


As always through we will be open every day during school holidays so from Sat 15th to Sun 27th we'll be open EVERYDAY.





## Life is a Minestrone

Do you know that you have two brains? Yes, it's

true. Not many of us, because it is not a well-known fact, think about or know this. For most of us, the simple and learned fact is that we have one brain. It governs us, tells us what to do, what to feel, how to act and react, feel pain, and when to eat and sleep and carry out all other bodily functions.

So where is our second brain? You may be surprised to learn that it is located in your gut. How many times have you heard someone say, 'I've got butterflies in my tummy', or 'I have a sick feeling in my stomach'? This happens when you are excited or nervous or even scared or emotional. This second brain is called the ENS - the enteric nervous system. This could explain why people say they have a 'gut feeling' about something. The brain and the gut are constantly talking to each other. The ENS controls your digestion and releases enzymes and controls your blood flow. The neurotransmitters it produces help to control and regulate your mood.

It makes sense then that we look after our gut as poor gut health can lead to many problems including a shift in our mood because it influences how we feel. A diet that is poor and lacking in the essential nutrients and a wide variety of foods (especially plants) can often lead to a 'leaky gut'. There are trillions of microbes that live in your gut and this collection of microorganisms make up your microbiome. Each person has their own individual microbiome, and this is affected and altered by your lifestyle, the choices you make in terms of diet and drugs, and even the environment in which you live. The leaky gut happens when the lining of the gut is damaged and some of these microbes – which are fine in the gut

but can cause damage elsewhere – leak out into the bloodstream.

So how can you ensure that you have a healthy gut? Diet is the key when it comes to a happy and productive community of microbes. This is where you can make a real difference, and you can start straight away. Wrong food choices can lead to gastrointestinal problems which will determine how you feel.

### This is what I have learnt:

- 1. Ultra-processed food is not real food.
- 2. Eating at least 30 different plants a week will keep your gut happy.
- 3. What you eat will determine how you feel physically and mentally.
- 4. Eating low-fat and sugar-free foods does more harm than good.
- 5. All fats do not belong under the same umbrella.

### Let's unpick this.

What are ultra-processed foods? These are 'foods' which you would find it difficult to recreate in your own kitchen. They contain additives, artificial flavourings, stabilisers, emulsifiers, colours, artificial sweeteners and preservatives. If there is anything in the ingredient list that you wouldn't find in your own kitchen cupboard, then the chances are that the food is ultraprocessed. According to the Zoe website, they also undergo a range of industrial processes such as hydrogenation and moulding and contain additives like dyes, stabilisers and deforming agents. They have high levels of unhealthy fats, refined sugars and salt. 'Diets high in ultraprocessed foods have been linked with increased risk of heart disease, weight gain, cancer, and even mortality' (Zoe).

You can start to limit how much of these 'foods' you eat by choosing wisely. Read the ingredient list of what goes into your shopping basket. If you don't recognise it, avoid it. Buy whole foods – fruit,

vegetables, nuts and seeds, and dairy such as eggs, yoghurt and cheese. Even bread is highly ultra-processed, and you may be surprised by what goes into making it.

30 plants a week is good for the gut. Unbelievably, it is possible to eat 30 different plants a week. It may sound like a lot but it's perfectly doable. Plants are not just fruits and vegetables but also include nuts, seeds, olive oil, the whole variety of spices, pulses and legumes, wholegrains like black or brown rice, quinoa, and couscous, oats and whole wheat, and dark chocolate - yes, dark chocolate! Team the dark chocolate with a cup of coffee and add them both to your plant count. And, even better is that different plants means that you can count the same plant twice if it is another colour - like red, green, and yellow peppers. Download the Plantversify app and start counting today.

We really are what we eat. If we eat a diet that is mainly made up of ultra-processed foods, take-aways, anything high in sugar and salt, unhealthy carbs and some saturated fats, we are likely to feel tired, lethargic and even hungry all the time. These foods are designed to profit the people who produce them and that is why they are made to taste so good. The high content of fats, sugars and other additives make them addictive so we eat more of them. This results in weight gain and health problems. We all know the popular Pringles slogan - 'once you pop, you just can't stop'- and this is exactly as it is. It is not easy to adapt and change but, if you really want to feel better, give it a go. Say no to anything which looks like it will likely cause you harm in the long term. Eating low-fat/fat-free and low-sugar/ sugar-free foods does more harm than good. This is a con tactic designed to manipulate the shopper into buying foods that are labelled low in fat and sugar or free from fat and sugar. We are conditioned to believe that these foods

are healthier and better for us than the full sugar and full fat varieties. In fact, and this may surprise or shock you, the opposite is true. Just think about it. Does the free-from sugar and fat food still taste good? Of course it does otherwise we wouldn't eat it. How can this be though? Simply speaking, the real fat and sugar content that has been taken out has been replaced by other artificial fats and sugars to give it the same taste. However, these additional additives may mean that you are missing out on other essential vitamins and nutrients. Just think - what has gone into my low-fat yoghurt to make it taste this good? The Zoe website provides lots of useful information on this

All fats do not belong under the same heading. That's right – all fats are not going to be harmful and make you put on weight. There are good fats and bad fats. The good fats can be found in foods like nuts and seeds, avocados, eggs, nut butters, fatty fish (mackerel, salmon, herring, trout, and sardines) and extra virgin olive oil. These have even been found to reduce the risk of heart disease and lower cholesterol levels. Avoid fats which are labelled 'saturated' and 'trans' and choose the ones that are 'monounsaturated' and 'polyunsaturated'. Saturated fats can often be found in processed and ultra-processed foods like sausages, ham, burgers and red meat. Trans fats are those fats that are in takeaway foods and fried foods, cakes, biscuits, pies and margarines.

Looking after your gut doesn't have to be a chore. Adopt one thing that you might change and go from there. Giving up foods that you have eaten all your life will not be easy, but it can be done. A healthy and happy gut – remember, it's your second brain - means a healthier and happier you. So feed your microbes the food they love and let them party!





## **My Slimming** world journey



My journey started because I was going to become a surrogate; to start the fertility treatment a surrogate must have a healthy BMI, as I was 16stone 6lbs with a BMI of over 37, I needed to change, I started to cut down on foods I thought were unhealthy and lost a stone. I then began to struggle doing it on my own.

I had continuously spoke about my weight at work and my friend mentioned to me she was going to a local slimming world group and did I want to join her. I had heard about slimming world before as I have had friends join before and had great results, but I didn't understand the concept. However, I thought I would give it a go. On the 22nd of September 2021, with a starting weight 15stone 2 ½ lbs I went to my first slimming world group and there my weight loss journey began.

I learnt how to food optimise and stayed to group every week where I received help and support from my consultant and fellow slimming world members. After only 11 weeks I reached my Club10 at 13stone 9lbs. I started to feel the benefits of the weight loss, I suffered with back pain, as the weight dropped off, I felt the pain easing. A massive difference was changing our king size bed, I used to really struggle and get out of breath. But once I

started to lose the weight, I managed to change the bed with ease.

I went on to lose over 4 stone and reached my personal target after 10 months and became a target member 13th July 2022. I went from a dress size 18 to a size 12, I felt amazing in myself. The weight loss has changed my life, I have a young daughter and to be able to run around and play with her makes it all worth it.

As I continue to maintain my target weight, I always found myself talking about my journey and recommending people to slimming world, it always made me feel good to inspire people with my weight loss and encourage them that they can do the same, my consultant made me aware of an opportunity event that was coming up so I decided to pop along to see if it was something I would be more interested in, so I took the next steps to become a consultant myself so I can inspire and motivate more people on their journeys.

## Coleshill needs a reliable Post Office again

January might not be everyone's favourite month, but I've really enjoyed getting stuck in to a new year as your MP. I'm determined to make sure Britain has turned a corner and that a brighter future lies ahead. In parliament that has meant voting to create a new Armed Forces Commissioner who will stand up for military families, and for new rules cutting school uniform costs for parents and safeguarding vulnerable children.

In North Warwickshire and Bedworth, I have continued to hold HS2 to account for the disruption they are causing to residents. This month, I wrote to HS2 demanding answers about their unacceptable use of non-disclosure agreements for constituents trying to access compensation, and attended a residents' meeting at the HS2 site in Gilson Road where I pushed for them to unblock their dysfunctional complaints process and to open up the special cases scheme. When making a complaint to HS2, please make sure you put 'complaint' in the subject line of any letter or email. Last year, I launched an HS2 constituent newsletter, where I will be sharing updates of what I'm doing to tackle this problem. Sign up to receive it at www.

Campaigning in Coleshill, one issue that comes up a lot is the closure of the Post Office Counter and Post Box, and the poor service and sporadic hours at the replacement Post Office desk inside the One Stop shop on Coleshill High Street. It's not unreasonable for residents in Coleshill and the surrounding villages to expect to have a functioning Post Office.

This was an issue I took up straight away after being elected last July, when I wrote to the Post Office, Royal Mail and One Stop demanding improvements.

Since then, I haven't let the matter rest, and it was fantastic to see many Coleshill

residents at my community meeting at Coleshill Town Hall on 10 January. Nearly 100 people attended to hear from representatives of One Stop and the Post Office on what action they would be taking to fix things.

I'm pleased to have secured their commitment that the Post Office counter will now be open from 9am to 5:30pm Monday to Friday, and from 9am to 1pm on Saturdays, with plans to train more staff to build towards longer operating hours. One Stop will also be installing a new post box in the shop to replace the one that was removed from the High Street by Royal Mail, and One Stop will be introducing new security measures in the store.

While we did experience a small hiccup when the very next working day the Post Office counter didn't open on time, since then things seem to have greatly improved and I have not had any further issues reported to me. But if you do find the Post Office counter closed when it should be open, please do contact me because I am determined that from now on the people of Coleshill will have a functioning Post Office at the heart of their community.

And a few more things... We have local elections coming up in May. I am continuing to oppose Conservative-controlled Warwickshire County Council's attempts to delay them until next year – voters deserve to have their say.

I will be holding a drop-in surgery at Water Orton Community Library on 14 February 11am – 1pm and an appointment surgery in Coleshill on 29 March between 10am – midday. If there's something you think I could help with, please come along or make an appointment with my office.

## News from St Clement of Alexandria Green Lane, Castle Bromwich (known locally as St Clements Church)



## A poem by Spike Milligan starts: Smiling is infectious, You catch it like the flu When someone smiled at me today I started smiling too.

When asked a question he said: I thought about that smile, then I realized its worth. A single smile, just like mine, could travel around the earth. So, if you feel a smile begin, don't leave it undetected. Let's start an epidemic quick, and get the world infected!

How often do we sit and listen, to ask questions of someone older who although they are no longer agile have led an interesting life and when they are no longer with us we wish we had taken the time to ask those questions. Why, what, when and how? From the generation that served in two World Wars to those that were left at home.

St. Clements Church, built in the 1960s, holds a rich history. Although we have some archival records, we are often reminded of the many important questions we wish we had asked.

Memories of the Sunday School, with its four classes of 12 children each, bring smiles to our faces. One snowy day, the Christmas Party seemed impossible; we trudged up the road, convinced no one would come. But they did—and what a wonderful time we had!

The youth group's participation in the 26-mile Birmingham Walkathon was another highlight. A van was essential to support them, ensuring the day's success. Then there were the camps, where participants were explicitly told to bring only plastic plates—yet someone

inevitably brought metal ones. The clatter they made in the middle of the night when someone got up was unforgettable! Outings to places like the American Theme Park, with everyone piling onto the coach, were the foundation of cherished memories.

Those truly were the days, filled with laughter, adventure, and moments we'll never forget.

While we still create memories, the ways in which we do so have changed over time. In the past, there was no such thing as Safeguarding Policies or Data Protection, both of which are vital today. As you enter the church, you'll find our Safeguarding Policy displayed on the noticeboard, having been re-adopted by the PCC in September 2024. It's also available on our website and Facebook page. We encourage anyone with concerns to reach out to our Vicar or Safeguarding Co-ordinator. As a church, it is our mission to ensure everyone feels safe, valued, and appreciated.

At the end of November, a group of intrepid adventurers visited Worcester Victoria Market. Blessed with good weather, they returned tired but happy after a delightful day. December is always a busy month for churches, and ours was no exception. From the Festive Tea and Entertainment at the start of the month to the Christingle service led by the 4th Castle Bromwich Brownies, the season was filled with joy.

A stand out event was the evening of December 22nd, when St. Mary and St. Margaret joined St. Clements under the direction of Stuart Jeffs, who wrote the inspirational "Born to Love." The talent on display from the band and singers was remarkable, and the opportunity to sing beloved carols together was truly uplifting. We hope this becomes a cherished annual tradition.

The Crib Service and the Nine Lessons and Carols brought the congregation together to hear passages from the Bible in anticipation of the birth of Christ. The stable was lovingly prepared and waiting, symbolizing the moment when there was "no room at the inn."

## **Platinum February Update**

We thought for this month we'd have the last couple of years we've been seeing a more in-depth look at wallpaper and the various ways it can be used in your home. Choosing a wallpaper can be a minefield, there are literally thousands of different designs to choose from and as if that isn't enough it's also worth taking into consideration the quality. A poor quality paper will be far less likely to leave a good finish, regardless of how experienced you are, this is further complicated by it not being as simple as getting what you pay for- it's not always the case that more expensive papers are higher quality. With that in mind we'd suggest reading any available online reviews that focus specifically on difficulties in working with the paper. Better still, if you get the chance then seek the advice of a professional decorator- we've worked with all of the most commonly used brands and will be able to advise you whether or not you're going to have any problems.

Now, let's get back to deciding on a wallpaper. For a long time it was fashionable to just have one or two papered feature walls in a room but over

a bit of a shift back to having whole rooms papered. The first thing to decide is whether you want to make a bold statement or simply add a bit of subtle texture to a room. Using a wallpaper with a neutral colour but some texture can add interest and warmth to a room without taking the focus away from decorative features such as fireplaces. Textured papers are often considered to be more traditional but there are many modern variations available that feature subtle patterns that appear to change depending on lighting conditions. Another advantage of textured paper is that it can disguise uneven walls and due to being thicker is usually easier to work with.

Another option is to look at patterned papers. If you are tempted but nervous about using flamboyant patterns then it can be good idea to try something out in a room that isn't used as much such as a spare bedroom. This can give you an idea of what it's like to live with while not being in your face on a daily basis. A commonly held belief is that larger patterns are better for bigger rooms and small patterns are better for small rooms. While this can be the case it's also true that using a large pattern in a small room is great for creating a sense of drama. It's important not to feel restricted when

considering paper for small rooms. We've seen many examples of small cloakrooms that have been papered using busy and intricate patterns to great effect. Pattern designs that run vertically can have the visual effect of extending the walls from floor to ceiling, this can be useful in rooms with low ceilings to create the illusion of more space. Using a paper with a dark, bold pattern in a small room or a bedroom can really enhance the feeling of a cosy, relaxing environment, on the other end of the scale a busy, intricate pattern is not always the best option for bedrooms as these can be less relaxing and are better suited to rooms or areas you spend less time in. In rooms with poor light metallic papers can bounce any available light around the room which can greatly improve the natural light available. On a large flat wall in a big room a soft, delicate pattern that looks less distinct from a distance can have a softening effect and create interest across an otherwise flat and uninteresting walls.

Some technical aspects to take into account when choosing wallpaper are whether or not you will be lining the walls prior to papering. It is a misconception that if walls are in good condition they don't need lining, it is often the case that lined walls will provide a better, higher quality finish to your wallpaper by

reducing the risk of the seams opening. If you check the back of the label for the hanging instructions most wallpaper manufacturers will recommend or even insist on lining prior to hanging the paper. This means that if there is a problem with the paper once you've hung it and you haven't lined the wall the manufacturer won't accept any responsibility and you'll be left out of pocket. Also think about the manufacturing process- most modern papers are produced using laser printing but some more traditional papers such as Farrow and Ball are still manufactured using traditional processes. While this often means a beautiful, hand finished quality it also means that they are susceptible to discrepancies in the pattern. If you are a perfectionist then this might not be the type of paper for you. Before hanging the paper read the label to check if a certain type of paste is recommended. Generally ready mixed paste will be more effective and help you achieve better results than powdered adhesive. Due to their higher performance and they are suitable for the majority of wallpapers. Finally always remember to check the batch numbers on the rolls of wallpaper. If they are from different batches there can often be discrepancies in the pattern and colour of different rolls.


